

SFF Status Report-2010

Our annual report was to our parent organization FFF and we would like to share the report with you. Joe Dail did a fantastic job as Treasurer and compiled the report to FFF. SFF is a healthy organization and ended the year with a balance of \$6,401.49. The best parts of the report were the activities. The board and membership met every month (except for no membership meeting in December) with a program at the membership meetings. The list of speakers was superb. We had monthly outings including one in December and a trip to the Everglades. Several of the outings included members from the Mangrove, Tampa and the Tarpon clubs.

We had two well attended casting clinics orchestrated by FFF certified master fly caster, Pat Damico. SFF participated in 5 events which included the Tampa Bay Boat Show, Marine Quest, Kasting with Kids at Walter Fuller, Florida Fly Fishers Expo and Tampa Bay Watch Costal Cleanup. A continuing successful program, Project Healing Waters Fly Fishing had 13 SFF members who contributed 1,036 hours of fly tying and fly casting to 521 veterans thanks to Terry Kirkpatrick and John Craig.

"On the Fly" had a banner year thanks to editor, Paul Sequira. The articles and fly tying and fly casting tips were first class. We even became political when the oil spill in the Gulf occurred. The board supported advocacy for holding the companies who were operating Deepwater Horizon rig responsible for the cleanup and environmental impact. We advocated writing our congressmen to insure that payment for the disaster is the responsibility of the companies operating the rig and not with tax payers.

We had a fly tying workshop and will continue this activity.

There were many other aspects of the report and they all reflected the enthusiasm of the members of the club. On behalf of the officers and directors we wish to thank all the members for their support and for participating in the activities of our club. Ray is a native Floridian, born in St Petersburg, grew up in Gulfport and has been fishing the Tampa Bay area for over 50 years. Specializing in fly fishing and light tackle, Ray (also a former member of SFF) is one of the most knowledgeable guides in the area. Ray's programs are always entertaining and full of local knowledge; you'll learn a lot about fishing for our premier fishes, the right flies to use and the best times and places to go. Designated Fly Tier: Capt Pat Damico will tie a one step synthetic baitfish fly he has developed called "Pat's One-step Baitfish". All the material will be placed on the hook at one time and any needed color will be applied with markers as the second step if desired. This technique lends itself to using a variety of synthetic materials and is very simple to tie effectively.

Casting Tips by Capt. Pat Damico, MCI

Casting tip #14 - How can I cast more effectively when the wind is blowing straight at me?

Our recent casting clinic was on a very windy day when this became a serious issue. You must do the following: Have a very tight loop on your forward cast, adding a haul will increase line speed and penetrate the wind better; change your casting plane from parallel with the water to one that is high on the back cast and low on the forward cast; cast horizontally close to the water with tight loops. The higher your forward cast, the longer the wind has to blow it back at you. Use a lighter line than recommended for your rod, it will penetrate the wind better, shorten the leader and downsize your fly.

Baitfish Fly Patterns That Fish Eat By Pat Damico

As fly fisherman, we are given a rare opportunity, especially if we tie our own flies because there is no limit to our creativity when sitting down at the tying bench. The variety of materials available to help create great patterns has never been better. When I first began to tie flies, a Herter's catalog and my hunting trips were supplemented with a few trips to local farms where bandy roosters were carefully selected for their plumage. Sunday morning church services had me distracted by fancy feathered hats worn by some of my female neighbors. Each fly as it left the vise was carefully scrutinized to make sure it was perfect. Dry flies were dropped on the table to make sure they bounced and stood upright indicating that they would ride nicely on the waters surface. Wet flies and streamers were carefully contoured to entice subsurface feeding fish.

Although I still enjoy freshwater trout and bass fishing, much of my time is spent fishing the salt. As I get older, my

interest in tying size 20 flies has been replaced with larger patterns that frequently duplicate baitfish. I wish I could limit the number of flies I tie and carry, but the desire to tie a new pattern or modification of an existing fly still fascinates me. Holding a killer fly in your hand doesn't necessarily assure success. Think of the many times your perfect fly was mutilated after catching fish repeatedly only to perform better.

Bigger doesn't necessarily mean better when fly fishing. I remember an incident a few years ago when I was wade fishing at Ft. DeSoto Park. Another angler was fly fishing to my right and was casting a fly that looked like it was eight inches long. I waited for him to get closer and asked him how his morning was going. His response was that he hadn't caught anything, even though he saw several fish. The flies he was using were the same he had successfully used in the surf in Massachusetts, where he did most of his fishing. Large stripers were his targets there, with most of his fishing after dark. In order to cast such large flies, he was using a ten-weight rod, a weight forward full sinking line and a rather short heavy leader. Fly fisherman can make the same mistake as spin fisherman using tackle that is very heavy. I gave him a few small baitfish patterns and a different leader. He looked at my flies like they would never work. Several minutes later, I saw his rod bent as he shouted to me to get my attention.

Kayak fishing recently with a friend who was using the same setup, I had showed the importance of varying your retrieve and depth. He was not having much success, but connected to his first good fish while mimicking my retrieve. His initial movement imparted to the baitfish pattern was jerky and near the surface. I was using a slow, long retrieve after waiting for the fly to sink

A list of suitable patterns to duplicate baitfish could include Lefty's Deceiver, a half and half, which is half Deceiver and half Clouser minnow, a Clouser Minnow and a Bendback. These all are usually tied with animal hair and feathers. Substitute synthetic material for these patterns. These traditional proven patterns are great, but I must confess I use a lot of totally synthetic patterns that are very productive. My Bead Butt Baitfish, EP patterns as well as those with added flash should be included in your selection. Some unusual colors work well: chartreuse/white, black/purple and brown/orange are some of my favorites. Eyes, frequently oversized, add appeal to any pattern. Matching the hatch is always a good starting point, but sometimes being unconventional leads to better results.

The fish are always our best teacher and will reward good performance. Now that you have selected a suitable fly, put it to work in the water and enjoy some great fishing.

Tying Bench - Tap's Bass Bug by Paul Sequira

H. G. Tapply was a featured columnist for Field and Stream magazine for over 35 years. Each month he wrote "how-to" articles and his "Taps Tips" column consisting of a handful of tips about the outdoors. He also wrote hunting and fishing books, feature articles and presented outdoor seminars. "Tap" Tapply was one of my favorite outdoor writers. Tap's Bass Bug presented here is a simple to tie deer hair bug that casts easily and is as effective today as it was when he developed it.



Materials

- Hook Mustad 3366, Size 6 to 1/0
- Thread Danville Flatwaxed Nylon or Uni Thread 3/0 white or yellow
- Tail Bucktail twice the hook shank. length
- Body Spun and trimmed deer body hair, color your choice. This example uses white and yellow. Natural deer hair with a red band at the head is also a good choice.

Tying Instructions

- 1. Tie in the thread with a jam knot above the hook barb keeping most of the hook shank bare. Deer hair spins easier on a bare shank
- 2. Select a small bunch of bucktail that is fine & straight from the end of the tail up towards the tip. Trim the butt ends and tie in by the butts with tight wraps right above the hook point. The bucktail should be about twice the length of the hook shank.
- 3. Select a batch of deer body hair and remove any under fur. The white fur from the belly spins best Tie in a bunch of deer hair about the thickness of a pencil. Clip the fine ends off the hair before you spin it they don't flare or float and need to be cut.
- 4. Hold a "pencil sized" bunch of cleaned deer body hair at a 45° angle to the side of the hook shank facing you. Take two or three loose wraps of thread around the center of the bunch of hair. Pull the thread down slowly while releasing the hair from your left hand. The deer hair will spin around the hook shank and flare under the pressure. Work a couple of thread wraps to the front of the flared hair.
- 5. Repeat the steps 3 & 4 above until you've covered the shank leaving space for the front band about ½ inch. Half hitch the thread and use a drop of head cement to secure the materials.
- 6. Select a contrasting color of deer body hair; yellow or red is a good choice. Spin on the contrasting deer body hair at the head of the bug as described above.
- 7. Pack the hair tightly and tie a neat small head behind the hook eye. The next step is to trim the body shape. Work slowly while you trim, you can always take some more hair off, but you can't put any back on. You may use scissors or a razor blade (a double edge blade broken lengthwise works best) to trim the body.
- 8. The first cut is flat on the underside of the hook. Cut away enough material to open the hook gap to allow enough room to hook the fish. Continue to work the fly in the round, making small and fine cuts with your scissors or razor blade. Trim the body to a conical shape as seen in the picture and use your scissors to trim around the tail and face of the bug. Secure the thread wraps at the head with head cement and the bug is finished
- 9. Coat the face of the fly with a little Flexement to stiffen it a bit. This will let you pop the bug on the surface.






