

September Membership Meeting with Capt. Pat Damico



President Rick Warfel brought members up to date on board decisions and other issues, like how do we get more membership participation in the Covid-19 era.



Capt. Pat Damico Zoomed into our September meeting from his summer home in Pennsylvania and took questions from fellow members.

Even though the September meeting was on Zoom, attendance was darn good. It looked like 26 or 27 signed in for the online meeting. That's pretty good for a "virtual" meeting.

After a brief discussion on how to maximize our online participation on Zoom, Facebook, our website, and our club's YouTube channel, the meeting got down to real business - how to catch more fish. Our guru was Capt. Pat Damico, an FFI Master Casting Instructor, and a pro in the salt, the fresh, and the brackish.

Pat took questions from members, like the first two from James Davis.

- What is the best fly color? ANSWER: Lefty nailed that one. Chartreuse over white.
- What about the size of the fly? ANSWER: Going bigger is never better. Presentation is all important.
- Are flies more effective if tied with circle hooks. ANSWER: Not necessarily. Bruce Evensen added that when fishing with circle hooks it's important not set the hook. Rather let the fish swim away then take up the slack. That way the hook sets itself in the lips of the fish.
- Should we use mono filament or fluorocarbon for the leader? ANSWER: There's a major difference of opinion on this in the fly fishing world. But, remember, fluorocarbon sinks and monofilament floats. So use mono when casting a floating fly. You can switch (or not) to fluoro when fishing a subsurface
- What are your favorite knots to the fly? ANSWER: Pat recommends the Davy knot when you want a small, tidy connection to the fly. Pat likes the Homer Rhode loop knot to promote fly action. Also, as an aside, Pat volunteered that if you get a wind knot in your leader you can expect that it's strength is reduced by 50%.
- Got any secrets about reviving and releasing gamefish? ANSWER. It's important that you unhook the fish quickly. A rule of thumb is don't take longer to release the fish than you can hold your own breath.
- Is the double-haul fly cast good to know? Yes, it's good for extra distance, but make sure you do it correctly. Otherwise you'll be doing what Lefty said --throwing your mistakes farther.

Carl Hanson: Lord of the Flies. Godfather of Fly Fishing.

Our October outing is always the Carl Hanson outing. So, who was Carl Hanson?

Carl was a fly fisher and fly tier and, importantly, a fly fishing teacher. On Tuesday nights he taught fly casting in his backyard. Come one, come all. Then inside, with everybody sitting at Esther's kitchen table, he taught fly tying including two flies that made Carl Hanson famous, the Glass Minnow fly and the Bendback fly. He also taught his casting and tying skills from the fly shop and adjoining lake at Bill Jackson's Shop for Adventure in Pinellas Park.

Somebody gave him the nickname *Lord of the Flies* and it stuck. Carl died in 1998 and he will long be remembered, especially by old timers at his two fly clubs, Suncoast Fly Fishers and Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club.

The Godfather of flyfishing in Tampa Bay is dead. But his legacy will go on. Carl Hanson passed away last Sun-

day at his home in St. Petersburg, the same little house where he taught thousands of anglers to fly cast and tie flies over four decades of free Tuesday night seminars.

Hanson, who looked like Santa Claus but talked like the tough old ship-fitter he was, was 84. He left behind wife

Esther, who plans to carry on the Tuesday night traditions with open houses and free instruction as long as there are interested anglers, and his 13-year-old Pomeranian, Bear, who has been taking his sudden absence rather hard.

Hanson was a messiah of flyfishing

long before it became the yuppie sport it is today. He was initially a freshwater angler, and loved chasing panfish with topwater bugs, though he became a saltwater flyrodder in his later years and devised what is probably the most famous of all flies for Spanish mackerel, the Carl Hanson Glass Minnow.



I am so sad to hear that Dave has passed away. I spoke to him a few weeks before he died and I had no idea it would be the last time I would hear his voice. We did not socialize outside of the club but I considered him to be a personal friend. At our club meetings I always sat next to him at the raffle table that he was in charge of. When we had our monthly give away for a subscription to a saltwater fly fishing magazine, he often joked about not ever winning and hoping I could somehow skew the raffle in his favor. He never did win but a few months ago I gave him a subscription to that magazine. He had a wonderful sense of humor and I know that he cared deeply about fly fishing and about his many friends in the club. All of us will miss him greatly. Rick Warfel

Tim Elms: Are you fly CON-fident?

Howdy! Ok, I'm going to brag on myself for something that most of us do..... the old, bring too many flies with us, buy way too many flies, and keep way too many flies. Trout guys usually love 10 flies. I mean ten patterns in 4 different sizes! This is salt and warm water. Throw it all out!!! (Not literally). Throw it out of your mind.



Speckled Love

I fish three flies for each type of fish. By type, I mean salt or fresh and brackish, a combo of both. My flies that I love and know how to fish. They make me confident when I fish. My confidence flies. My con flies work well with my floating line and I can manipulate them while stripping.

When it comes to salt, I prefer a white bait or a top water. White bait patterns work during the high sun and into the evening. In fresh water I prefer top water over most things. I will mix in a white bait or even a glass minnow pattern. Basically, if I see fish eating in my casting range, they are going to eat bait on the top. Are they gonna miss it? Heck yes, they do. But nothing is more fun than top water hookups. Period.

Why would we carry a pack full of flies we won't fish? I always have 20 maybe 30 Clousers with me. I rarely fish with Clousers. Sure, I've caught big and small fish on Clousers. But I rarely fish them when I am serious about my target.

Bass eat anything

Crab flies???? Bwaahahah. What are they doin' here? I have yet to catch a fish on one. Shrimp patterns? Yeah sure. I like a fiber shrimp with barely anything on it. No need for fancy hard shrimps.

If you spin fish and have success on plugs, swimbaits or whatever, try flies that imitate those same things. There are quite a few flies out there that do the same thing for us bug whippers. Remember, most in shore guides in the bay area usually prefer white bait or a shrimp.

Your con flies may rotate for a season or target and change sizes. But, when you start to fish them day in and day out, you will be rewarded. Let's give our shoulders a break. All of the fish on this page were caught on the same fly.

Cindy and I went up north to visit her mom in NJ. We had not seen her in over a year. Her health is not the best at 88. We felt that Covid risk aside they needed to see each other. So we made the journey north and spent a good amount of time with her. We also got to visit with Cindy's three older sisters and our brothers in law. We tried to social distance as best as we could, but when you see your mom and siblings whom you have not seen in a long time it is hard not to get emotional and want to hug each other – so we did. On the day we left Cindy and her mom had a very hard time saying good-bye.

Fall is striper season in NJ – for most of the east coast for that matter. My fly fishing mentor, Captain Ray Szulczewski (retired) would have taken me out, but Covid risk is too great for a person with one functioning kidney coupled with heart disease. Ray and I talked on the phone, but we did not visit. As the person who introduced me to and ignited my passion for fly-fishing, I look forward to and enjoy his company as if he were a brother. It was tough to be up in NJ and not be with Ray on the TideRunner chasing stripers on the fly. We both openly hoped for a vaccine sooner than later, so that we can fish the 2021 spring migration.

A childhood friend, Jerome DiPentino, lives in Longport just south of Atlantic City. Jerome is an avid, crazed backwater striper fisher. That's all he does. The problem is that Jerome slings plugs – all the time! If it isn't on top water, he doesn't waste his time. Jerome and I did fish together, twice. We didn't shake hands, hug or high five. We tried to stay away from each other. It was tough, especially when you're having fun fishing. I put down the fly rod and picked up a spin rod with a Smack It Jr popper – color doesn't matter, hungry stripers hit anything that moves. Over the course of two days we landed stripers no smaller than 28", I landed one at 35" 16 lbs. Jerome was beside himself, telling me it was the biggest backwater striper ever landed on his boat. It took a good 5 minutes to convince the big migrator to come to the boat for the pic.

While up north, I learned that Dave Barson had passed away. I don't mind telling you I cried. As Covid hit, I was not able to see Dave. I did manage to call and talk to him. Dave was a genuinely good person. When I joined the club back in 2016, he was the first person to say hello to me at my first club meeting, and then immediately asked me for \$5 to buy into the raffle – haha! Thanks to Dave, Alan and Ted I got to enjoy volunteering at the VA with the veterans. Despite his own health challenges, Dave made it to the VA most weeks, taking part in the fly tying sessions, telling stories, laughing and above all making sure our veterans knew we cared about them. Here is a guy who was suffering, but he put that aside to show other people they were more important. I admired Dave for the manner in which he persevered through his illness and for how well he represented Suncoast Fly Fishers.

I miss our meetings, our fly tying, and our outings; simply I miss all of you. I look forward to a time when we can easily meet together and have fun again; I pray that you all stay healthy and safe. In the meantime, and as you can fish-it!








David Redd: Native Brook Trout in Maine

Smitty's Fly Box: Cruella De Vil

As I was tying flies one day with one eye on the vise and the other eye on my daughter (she was watching her favorite Disney movie "101 Dalmatians") I noticed the colors I was using in my fly matched the colors of the main villain in the movie ... hence the name Cruella de Vil. as I tied the same fly in different colors, I used other "sinister" names for my assassin flies --The Green

Meanie, Purple Peril! Dead -drift this fly as you would any nymph (free-

line or under an indicator). If you want to be more proactive you can also fish it like an emerger, rising it to the surface with finger rolls or small twitches. Either way, hungry fish will take notice!

Smitty

Materials (Listed in the order they are attached to the hook.)

Hook: Mustad Model R50-94840 Size 10

Thread: 70 Denier UNI-Nylon or your preference (Black)

Under-body: Woolly Nylon (White)

Abdomen: Micro Tubing (Red) (i.e. larva lace, v-rib or the like)

Thorax: Two Strands of Ostrich Herl (Black) reinforced in a thread dubbing loop Hackle: Hungarian Partridge (Natural w/ prominent brown markings toward tip) *

Cement: SHHAN or Solarez UV Resin

Tying Sequence:

- 1. Put down a base wrap of thread stopping just above the point of hook.
- 2. Attach the wooly nylon or substitute white floss then attach the Micro Tubing (larva lace, v-rib or the like). Advance thread to two eye widths behind the hook eye. Wrap nylon (or floss) forward to standing thread creating a tapered body as you go. Over-wrap body with tubing, tying off tubing and body thread with black thread Cut off excess tubing and white thread.
- 3. Create a dubbing loop with black thread and insert the two strands of ostrich herl. Spin dubbing loop to reinforce herl collar. Wrap dubbed ostrich as a collar (about 2 or 3 turns should do if the loop is full. If it is sparse, use as many wraps as you need to get desired effect).
- 4. Tie in a hackle feather and wrap in a sparse collar, again about 2 or 3 turns. Tie off, cut and discard the remaining hackle.
- 5. Create a nice head, tie off and cut thread. Cement with SHHAN or UV Resin
- *NOTE: You may substitute Natural (black with white spots) guinea fowl for the partridge. You may also substitute green or purple Micro Tubing to create "The Green Meanie" or "The Purple Peril" !!!

Bruce Evensen: Crustacean Fly

This is the October fly of the month. It's a spider-like shrimp fly/crab fly for all inshore species, but especially snook and redfish. Fish it slowly just under the surface.

Materials

Hook: #4 or #2 3407

Thread: Red flat waxed nylon

Body: Brown bucktail Eyes: Crab/shrimp eyes "V"

Legs: Barred orange Silly Legs. Orange round feelers.

Tying Sequence

Step one. Wrap the hook from the hook eye to the hook point with red thread.

Step two. Take brown bucktail about half pencil thickness - lay the cut ends facing the hook point. - wrap them on back to the Hook eye.

Step three. Fold brown bucktail back over the hook and tie down in front of hook point on the shaft.

Step four. Tie on a pair of shrimp eye.

Step five. Two 2 1/2 inch pieces of silly legs, one on each side, to form the legs. Add two orange feelers. Tie them on the same place you tie the eyes.

Step six. Epoxy over wraps, the body part and the eye wraps.

Capt. Pat Damico: Captain's Corner



Long, accurate casts required for spooky redfish.

"We used to practice on Tampa Bay redfish to catch bonefish in the Keys, now we practice on bonefish in the Keys to catch Tampa Bay redfish." That's a quote by Lefty Kreh, now deceased, a well-respected fly fisherman.

Fishing and boating pressure has changed our local fish behavior. Schools of reds are starting to feed heavily in the shallow water of our bay and surrounding areas in preparation for an upcoming spawn.

Guides who fish with bait are reporting many successful outings. Are those of us who prefer fly fishing at a disadvantage? Fly fishing for reds in shallow water is more like hunting. Be very stealthy, cautious, wear clothes that blend

in with the environment, and be able to make long accurate casts with a minimum of false casting. If in a boat or kayak, leave the watercraft and wade slowly enough not to cause a ripple.

Carefully place a good imitation of a baitfish, shrimp or crab close to the nose of a wary red. If fish are moving, lead them as you would when wing shooting. The cast will be where the fish will be soon after it lands. When pursuing tailing or slow-moving sighted fish, drop the offering close to the fish's nose without pulling it into his face. Smaller flies, size 2-4, and long fine leaders are necessary.

Everyone wants to know what fly pattern will work. Presentation is always more important-than a specific pattern. When using a baitfish, shrimp or crab fly, work it like what you are trying to imitate.
