

President's Letter, February 2021

Suncoast Fly Fishers,

Time for a little humor.

I have been fly fishing for over 50 years and for most of that time I was largely self-taught. It is much like my golf swing which has be compared to a man with a free suit. You know the old joke about the free suit. A man wins a free suit but when he tries it on, he finds that one arm is too short, so he takes it back to the store to complain. The tailor thinks for a moment and tell the customer to lower his right shoulder to make the arms look even. "But when I

do that it pulls up at the waist." Said the customer. The tailor tells the customer to lean forward to straighten that out. He leaves the shop awkwardly walking bent forward with one shoulder drooping. A couple sees the man leaving and the husband says, "Look at that poor cripple leaving the clothing store." The woman said, "Yes but he has a great tailor, the suit fits perfectly."

As with most saltwater fly fishermen, I always want to be able to cast farther and like many fly casters I often go about it the wrong way. I lunge with the rod on my final casting stroke. I know better but it is a habit that I find difficult to break. At the last casting clinic, Dayle Mazzarella addressed the topic of constant acceleration. It is not enough to maintain your rod speed during the cast. You must continue accelerating in order to load the rod properly. He compared it to a proper golf swing. You must start slow and continue to accelerate as the club head passes through the ball.

That really resonated with me. My casting hasn't gotten any better, but my golf game has improved significantly.

Bob Burkard: February 20 Outing - Fort De Soto Park



Ph.D. Candidate Christina Welsh at SFF January Meeting




Christina Welsh, Ph.D. candidate, is researching how climate change affects fish populations. She was the recipient of SFF's first marine science scholarship at the University of South Florida

Suncoast Fly Fishers' 2020 scholarship winner joined us Thursday, January 21 and updated us on her research to help determine the effects of global warming on saltwater gamefish.

Christina Welsh, a second year Ph.D. candidate studying biological oceanography, is digging into the possible effects of climate change on salt fish populations. The major takeaways are that populations will be negatively affected because their larvae are more vulnerable to water temperature changes and that those changes will be more severe in estuaries, home to most larvae. Her conclusion is that it will be very important for fish management agencies to include these stressors in their studies and regulations.




like populations of our favorites -- seatrout, redfish, snook, tarpon -won't be hanging around here. They're going to move north.

Tim Elms: Don't be afraid of the dark




Howdy! Happy February. I had a lot going on this past month. Work, family, and weather got in the way of lots of fishing.

But, I have found that fishing in the dark can really help you understand timing and control of your loops. Fish eat at night also.



Nightime is sometimes the best time

Here are some of my tips for fishing in the dark...lying on our backs and counting the stars.



Snook love to feed at night

throw at night.

First, safety though. Bring a light! Duh. Try to go with someone. Plan before you go. Meaning, be sure of your surroundings --water, banks, trees, ledges, anything. Fish a spot during the day and make mental notes for fishing it in the nighttime. Bring a couple flies. No need to switch every 10 casts. I think they are either hungry or not.

Are there lights around? Even streetlights will make bait dance around in the glow. I like to try top water first! It's amazing to throw a top water and hear the boom when its completely dark and silent out.

Dark flies have worked best for me when I switch to bait patterns. Snook, bass, bluegill, and tarpon all have taken the same purple bunny I

Shorten and stiffen up your leader. Nothing worse than casting into a tree and losing your favorite fly. But at night your leader is much harder for fish to see so use that to your advantage.

Trust your cast. It's obviously harder to see what's going on with your loops. Night fishing will really show you how to feel for your rod to load and not seeing it happen. When in doubt just slow way down. Your "pause" between forward and back casts will start to come completely by feel.

Dial in your ears. Fish often feed in frenzies at night. They are safer not showing their location. Keep your ears peeled for any sounds of fish eating and get in there fast.

That's it. Give it a try especially when it really starts to heat up. Go somewhere you are remarkably familiar with and enjoy the wildlife. This is Florida, you never know what's out there.

Your Fish & Wildlife Officers Are On the Job*

Pinellas County

Lieutenant Bibeau observed an individual actively fishing and conducted a fisheries inspection on the angler's catch. The individual admitted to having a sixteen-inch redfish in a nearby bucket. Lieutenant Bibeau retrieved the undersized and out of season redfish and walked back with the individual to retrieve their ID from a nearby vehicle. Lieutenant Bibeau observed a cooler in the backseat of the vehicle which contained an undersized and out of season snook, two undersized gag grouper and one undersized mangrove snapper. Lieutenant Bibeau issued the individual the appropriate misdemeanor citations and warnings for the fisheries violations.

Escambia County

Officer Allgood received information that a person posted pictures of several illegal fish on Facebook. The post commented on the fish caught, and stated he caught a small gag grouper. Officer Allgood was able to determine where the person lived and responded to his residence. He spoke to the individual who posted the pictures and found that he still had the fish in a cooler. The individual was in possession of over the bag limit of red drum, undersized red drum, undersized mangrove snapper and undersized gag grouper. The individual was issued a notice to appear citation for the violations.

Brevard County

Officers Perry and Johnson were on patrol when they conducted a fisheries inspection on a man returning to land after fishing from a kayak. While talking with the man, he told the officers he had caught several redfish and trout. He also said he kept a trout and one redfish. After measuring the fish, Officer Johnson determined the redfish was oversized. In addition, it is illegal to possess redfish or trout in Lee County due to the executive order. The man was issued a notice to appear and warnings for the violations.

Columbia County

Officer Specialist McDonald wrapped up an investigation involving three individuals who posted a Facebook video of them playing with a baby alligator. In the video, the subjects take turns allowing the alligator to bite them on their fingers and one subject even allowed the alligator to bite him on the chest. Charges for the three are being filed with the State Attorney's Office for possession of an alligator.

Palm Beach County

Officer Trawinski responded to a call for service in Woodlands Middle School. Upon arrival, he noticed a fourfoot American Alligator walking through parking lot. The officer was able to catch and relocate an alligator without incident.

Bruce Evensen: Inshore Winter Shrimp



This is the February Fly of the Month for the Fort DeSoto Park outing. Bruce tied this fly on Zoom on Monday, Feb. 8.

Materials

Hook: #2 3407 Mustad Egg Sack: Orange Fiber

Legs: LT brown-barbed Silly Legs Body: Silver braid or Mylar wrap.

Head: Tan maribou

Body: Beige fine chenille

Eyes: Small barbell, black wing: white, yellow, olive bucktail.

Thread: Tan flat-waxed nylon.

Tying Steps

Step 1. Take thread wrap from hook eye to bend of the hook.

Step 2. Put small piece of orange fiber at the bend of the hook for the egg sac.

Step 3. Take 3 five inch pieces of silly legs, double over to have six legs, and tie in above egg sac.

Step 4. Tie in short small amount of tan marabou.

Step 5. Tie small black barbell slightly back from hook eye.

Step 6. Take beige chenille wrap from egg sac down hook shank to hook eye.


Step 7. Put drop of glue at the tie off.

Step 8. Get out and catch fish!

Smitty's Fly Box: Neerly Nuttin' Glass Minnow



This is a substitute for all you tiers who want to make gummy minnows but have a hard time handling the materials. The technique to make them is definitely different than most flies, but rather simple once you get it figured out. The fly consists of lightly cured acrylic resins. The final product is a realistic bay



anchovy or silversides imitation that is flexible and virtually indestructible! Fish it as you would any glass minnow style fly. The flexible rear two-thirds will swim like live bait. You can make this fly in 1", 2" or 3"

lengths to "match the hatch" of local baitfish according to time of season. S

Materials

Hook: Short Shank TMC 800S or Gamakatsu SC15 (adjust hook size to baitfish size)

Eyes: Stick-on Tape eyes

Lateral Line: Saltwater Flashabou or Holographic Flashabou

Body: Hard & Flexible Solarez UV Acrylic Resin **Optional:** Pearl foil tissue, glitter or markers

Glitz and glitter version

Tying sequence

Step 1. Draw a slender baitfish shape on a piece of paper (approx. 3" long).

Step 2. Create a digital file on the computer by scanning the shape.

Step 3. Print the baitfish shape on transparency film using a standard inkjet printer. To create different sized flies, simply adjust the picture size before printing. I make these flies in a variety of sizes between 1-3". With one sheet of transparency film, you can create many baitfish sizes.

Step 4. Cut one of the baitfish shapes out using scissors. This will act as your template.

Step 5. Lay the baitfish template flat with the hook placed on top of the template.

Step 6. Apply hard formulation of UV resin along the front third of the template from the hook eye to just past the hook bend. The hard UV resin gives the front portion of the fly strength so that the flexible UV resin portion of the fly (applied in step 8) will not rip off the hook. Note that you will complete one side of the fly before working on the opposite side.

Step 7. Apply eyes and lateral line to this side of the fly.

Step 8. Apply flexible UV resin along the entire length of the template to create a three dimensional shape for this side.

Step 9. Remove the template. The template can be reused to create many flies.

Step 10. Repeat steps 7 and 8 on the opposite side to finish the fly.

Shake a tail feather version

Bill Scarola: Mirrodine Fly



Bill was our guest tier on Zoom Monday, January 25. He wrote, "You can tie this in several ways. The goal is to imitate the Mirrodine lure. I've tied this fly from behind the hook eye going straight



back with materials but I prefer tying the material forward then pulling it back to form a fuller body.

MATERIALS:

HOOK: #1 or 2 stinger hooks or similar

THREAD: Flat waxed in white and or olive/gray UNDER BODY: Doll Hair in white or white EP fibers

UPPER BODY: EP fibers in mullet color or dark green Congo hair blend.

EYES: 4.5 -5mm holographic, stick on eyes. in red or silver

FLASH: Pearl Flashabou or Krystal Flash

BEARD: Red or orange marker

GLUES: Super glue and U V epoxy, and fletching glue or E6000 etc.

TYING SEQUENCE

- 1: Wrap hook from hook eye to bend.
- 2: Add a clump of white EP fibers approx. 2" long and tie forward of hook eye with several wraps of thread.
- 3: Add 3-4 strips of flash to hook shank so they are lying toward the bend.
- 4: Add your top EP mullet fibers & tie in forward as the lower white fibers.
- 5: Pull upper fibers back toward bend, and bring thread up to top of shank, then pull white fibers backward, be sure to keep the fibers separate.
- 6: Build up a dam of thread to hold materials back just behind the hook eye. A small clothespin helps here. Wet the material with your fingers and comb or brush back material. Be careful not to wrap your thread over the material at the head.
- 7: Attach the eyes. Add them with a drop of fletching glue or other. Place eyes on the darker color material above the hook shank. Keep eyes even.
- 8. Cover the eyes with a drop or two of THIN UV epoxy glue and cure, the thin will penetrate the fibers and help secure eyes.
- 9. Now trim your fly with scissors to shape the baitfish to a tapered body and tail. Hold your fly by the head and trim from the tail forward.

Capt. Pat Damico: Captain's Corner



Some fly fishers love winter's low tides

Cold fronts, wind, and very low tides have kept most shallow-water bait and spin fishermen home, but I know some fly fishermen who have waited for these conditions. It is not by coincidence that they are also excellent at spotting fish and even better at getting a fly exactly where it needs to be placed with accuracy and stealth. The way these anglers dress, you would think they are going ice fishing instead of fishing shallow-water flats on Florida's gulf coast. They generally wade fish, occasionally using a watercraft only to traverse deeper water on the way in or out of their very shallow destination. Watercraft can get you to areas that are fished very little because of the distance needed to their location. The largest redfish and trout are frequently caught this time of year in very skinny water. Think about some of

the shallow flats you are familiar with that have been productive in the past or some you avoided because they were fished heavily by guides and other fishermen. Sun at your back will help you see fish that could be difficult to see on overcast days, but be careful of casting a fish-scaring shadow. Use your favorite fly rod with a floating line and long leader tapered to 12 or 15-pound test. Use a loop knot to attach a favorite size 4 baitfish or shrimp pattern that has small bead chain eyes to keep the hook pointed up, improving your hook set.
