
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President's Letter, April 2021

Suncoast Fly Fishers,

Most of us don't learn to fish completely on our own. The first person that ever took me fishing was my mom. She did not really know a lot about fishing but she knew how much I loved it so she would take me to the local ponds and creeks to let me try my luck.

The person that really taught me how to fish was the drummer in my dad's band. His name was Truman Parmelee. Truman was a cartoonist from New York, and he was one of the funniest people that I ever knew. He was an exceptionally large man, and I was a skinny kid. Our club is full of generous members willing to share their time and expertise to help beginners and new members on where and how to fish. Collectively our outings offer great opportunities to gather and learn from many seasoned anglers with countless years of experience. Bill AuCoin usually leads a group on a wading expedition at each month's outing.

Alan Sewel and a dedicated group of members have spent innumerable hours working with veterans to teach fly tying, rod building and fly fishing. Tom Gadacz has led our efforts to introduce youth groups to fly fishing and fly casting.

Casting clinics are presented once or twice a year taught by our Master Certified Instructors Dayle Mazzarella and Pat Damico and Certified Instructor Chris O'Byrne.

Bruce Evensen has hosted hundreds of fly tying classes at his garage/studio each Monday evening. Students cover the full range of experience from novice to master. All are welcome.

One of the things that most impresses me are members that are willing to just take folks fishing. Tom Jones would often issue an open call for members to join him on a dock light expedition on a first call first come basis. Dennis Marquis had a mission to take as many members fishing with him as possible.

Fly fishing is not easy, and it can be intimidating. Having a mentor to guide you through the process is invaluable. I would encourage all of you to reach out to help get someone involved in the sport and best of all just take someone fishing.

Bob Burkard: March Fish Anywhere Outing Report

Well, March's freshwater-fish anywhere outing coincided with a cold front, just like the February outing. Coulda-toldya. After 9 years of living near Tampa Bay this humble guy who grew up in the Northeast US has acclimated to the Florida heat, so now a Florida cold front really does feel cold.

But lots of bass and bream were caught, and so was the invasive Mayan cichlid. Members had the option of fishing anywhere in Pinellas, Hillsborough, Manatee, or Polk Counties.

Tim Elms was really and truly a big winner. He won all three categories, catching an 18-inch bass, an 11-inch bluegill, and an 11.5-inch Mayan

cichlid. He caught 17 bass and ended the day with this texty signoff: "I'm pooped."

snake fly. Mandy caught five bluegills; her largest was 9 inches and it hit one of Smitty's beetle flies. Annie caught two small bluegills and a small bass on a white gurgler.

Bill Scarola launched and fished from his boat. He caught, in his words... "Nada –zippo.- I was shut

out! But the good news is that I fixed the leak in my Alumacraft, as it was bone-dry when I got back to the Ramp!! Yippie Kii Aaa!!"


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

Chris O'Byrne: Opportunity Knocks Fly Fishing



Chris O'Byrne was our April meeting speaker on Zoom.

Let's say you're running errands in the car. You pass a familiar strip mall. There's the car dealership. Oh, look. There's a retaining pond. You hadn't noticed that before. Opportunity knocks.

And by the way, did you put your fly rod in the car this morning? Flies?

Chris O'Byrne, a long time Suncoast Fly Fisher, was our April meeting speaker on Zoom. The official title of Chris' slide-show presentation was *SUBSIDIARY FISHING* and he made this point over and over. You can double your fly fishing pleasure by seizing moments to fish untraditional, secondary (and even tertiary) bodies of water.

Chris is a practice-what-he-preaches fly fisher who shares his knowledge.

His website is Featherwater.com.

His latest book is *The Beautiful Addiction*.

Recommendation: Watch the videos on the Orvis Guide to Fly Fishing site. Listen to this -- Fly Fishing Consultant Podcast.

Driving along if he sees a mangrove thicket he'll look for a place to pull off the road. Yes, he has walked through those tangled-root jungles and busted his way onto rarely-fished salt flats.



Over the years Chris has seized those slices of the day and fly-fished rain-runoff retention ponds, New York City's Central Park lake, drainage ditch spillways, a creek under railroad tracks, a bacteria-thick section of the Potomac River, and rapids behind the 7/11 in Webster, NY. Along the way he has successfully avoided





rattlesnakes, moccasins, gators, and bacterial infections.

Chris didn't admit to doing this, but he did seem to know a lot about how to get somebody to drop you off so you can fly fish those retention ponds in the middle of Interstate Highway clover-leafs.

Chris catches fish in these subsidiary spots. You will, too.



And, here's a plus: The next time you discover and fish a neighborhood pond it'll take you back to when you were a kid fishing those little ponds here and there. Be Prepared.

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
Terry Kirkpatrick: Tips for fly fishing Alligator Lake

Alligator Lake was one of the best brim lakes in Florida. I don't know if this is still true or not. My experience in the last few years is limited. A point. Two shoreline vegetations

There's only one launch point on alligator lake. That's a public boat ramp on the north west side of the lake, next to the Little League ball fields. The street to the boat ramp is off 7th Avenue south, at the railroad tracks. The ramp is good but parking is




Look for overhanging branches and fish the shadow line. Both the east and the west sides can be productive. Once again, fish the shadow line.

My favorite fly is a size 10 Spider, or an olive sparkle bugger

We caught them on all sorts of flies, but a diver and dark colored minnows worked the best. Especially when it got hot, a dark minnow that sank to the bottom and

stripped very slowly back was almost a sure thing every cast. Watch the fray as their mouth is very close to a snook's and they will wear out a leader very fast. We found out that a 30-pound fluoro bite tippet works best.




Tim Elms 200 bass equal 2,369.25 inches

Materials

Hook: 3407 Mustad, size 4

Thread: Flat Waxed Nylon. White

Tail: White bucktail, flash, silver Mylar

Collar: Palmer Crystal Chenille, medium

Eye: 4 mm. Red and black

Head: Epoxy coating


Tying Steps

- 1: Wrap shank from behind hook eye to hook point. Use $\frac{1}{2}$ match stick length of bucktail to tie on over thread wrap.
- 2: Tie on 4 or 5 strands of Mylar around the bucktail and tie on 2 or 3 wraps of medium chenille.
- 3: Glue on eyes just behind the hook eye.
- 4. Coat thread wraps and eyes with epoxy.

Smitty's Fly Box: Sink or Float Foam Panfish Fly



You can tie this foam fly to float or to sink. For the sinking version you tie a brass bead under the foam on the hook shank. Add the bead and the fly sinks slowly to be enticing to Mr. Picky Bluegill.



Smitty

Materials:

Hook: Mustad R50 size 8 or your favorite short-shanked hook

Weight: Small brass bead (optional) Thread: Yellow flat waxed nylon

Tail: Yellow marabou (yellow Krystal Flash optional)

Body: Yellow foam strip Legs: Yellow rubber legs Thorax: Peacock herl Head: Brown foam Eyes: Clear glass beads

Tying instructions:

- 1. Press down the barb
- 2. Tie in a tuft of yellow marabou as a tail. Length approx. 1½ times hook shank and tie in the foam on top of the hook shank (covering optional brass bead). Leave space for eyes and head.
- 3. Wind the thread forwards over the foam.
- 4. Fold the rear half of the foam forwards and tie down and cut off surplus.
- 5. Tie in two rubber legs as an X. Length approx. as a tail.
- 6. Cut a narrow triangle of brown foam and tie in over hook eye pointing forwards.
- 7. Tie in the eyes on top of the hook shank
- 8. Cover the base of the eyes and underside of the head with peacock herl.
- 9. Fold the brown foam tightly backwards over the head tie down and cut off surplus.
- 10. Whip finish.

David Putnam: World's easiest-to-peel hard-boiled eggs

Editor's note:

Hard boiled eggs have sustained many fly fishers who leave early and return late. Here's the deal: the best hard boiled eggs are those that are easiest to peel.

Since hard boiled eggs are so vital to our existence, I emailed Suncoast Fly Fishers and asked them to share their recipes. Alas, no takers. Finally, I had to reach out to former member David Putnam, who now lives in Maine. He would win the Great British Baking Show but they won't invite him to compete.

David said you can cook them the night before your fishing trip and bring them with you the next day. And he said it's okay to discard the egg shells in the water.

Directions: Easy to peel hard-boiled eggs

Bring one-inch of water to a rolling boil in a medium saucepan over high heat.



Place six eggs in steamer basket. Transfer basket to saucepan.

Cover, reduce heat to medium-low, and cook eggs for 13 minutes.



When eggs are almost finished cooking, combine two ice cubes and two cups of cold water in medium bowl. When the eggs have boiled for 13 minutes transfer eggs to the ice bath with a spoon or tongs. Let them sit for 15 minutes.

After cooling, put eggs in a grocery store egg container. For seasoning later include a Ziplock bag with a mix of salt, pepper, and perhaps a little paprika.



I usually peel the eggs before eating.

Capt. Pat Damico: Captain's Corner



How to score the Fly Rod Slam

Now is a great opportunity for a much sought-after fly rod slam. Fishing lighted areas at night, especially with this week's strong tides, will be a blast. Hungry predators will be feeding very actively where food is plentiful and easy to catch. Redfish, trout and snook will lazily inhale baitfish as the tide sweeps them into gaping mouths. Fish lighted docks and bridge fenders that are familiar during the day so that you can plan your obstacle-free approach. A bow-mounted electric motor is preferred rather than anchoring because larger fish can be turned away from the barnacle-encrusted structure that ruins fly lines and leaders. Keep your fly rod tip close to the water and avoid high sticking which can break long rods. Rig two 8- or 9-weight rods, one with a floating line and the second with a clear sinking tip. 25-pound

fluorocarbon tippets and loop knots tied to size 2-4 white baitfish imitations will produce, especially when cast up tide of the fish which will be oriented facing their incoming meal. Match available baitfish size. Strip setting when the fish is felt rather than raising the rod tip to set the hook will ensure a high rate of success. 

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
