• Our speaker is Jill Thompson-Grim, a PhD. Candidate with USF's College of Marine Science in St. Petersburg. She is the 2021 winner of the Suncoast Fly Fishers Educational Grant of \$500 and she is in the running for another grant from Fly Fishers International.

• Thompson-Grim's research is focused on how climate changes have affected Gulf of Mexico recreational and commercial fisheries such as changes in populations, habitat locations, and behavior.

• One of the reasons she chose USF for her research is that St. Pete is also the headquarters for NOAA Fisheries Southeast and the Coastal and Marine Science Center for the U. S. Geological Survey.

• President Rick Warfel will open the meeting at 7 pm for updates on club membership and finances plus meetings and outings. But come early for coffee, cookies, to chat up fellow members, and to buy SFF logo items and bucket raffle tickets.

Sweetwater Fly Fishing's Guru Jim Swann



Jim Swann's Flyfishing Outfitters in Dade City. Jim likes to fish a 6 weight. Says Jim, "You can get an excellent outfit for \$219. But if you really want to spend \$800 for a rod, please buy it from me."

Jim Swann probably knows more than anybody how to catch Central Florida sunfish like bass, bluegill, stumpknockers, shellcrackers, warmouth, speckled perch, and all the others. At our August meeting he shared his insights for successfully fishing freshwater or, as he sometimes calls it, "sweetwater."

Jim is proprietor of Jim Swann's Flyfishing Outfitters in Dade City. He's an avid fly fisher. He's an innovative fly tier, too. He tied 150 of his special flies for our club's raffles. Thank you, Jim!

And his insights gave us a good head start for beating the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club at the Hillsborough River competition October 22.



Myself? I love to catch a fish on the surface. You see it. You feel it.

Here's Jim:

- Be a line watcher. Sometimes it moves before you feel it.
- Don't move your fly fast but make it wiggle and pop a lot. Sometimes fish stop and watch it for a while. You have to wait 'em out.
- They don't really like coming to the surface to eat but they do because they have to. Anyway, it's more fun to catch 'em on topwater.
- Don't fish with a sinking line. It just gets hung up.

• "I want a fish on every cast. If I'm not getting bit on every cast I get mad."

• "Myself? I love to catch a fish on the surface. You see it. You feel it."

• Fish are not intimidated by big flies.

They don't want competition. They chase off intruders.

- Sometimes they can't stop trying to eat a fly. One time I had a fish hit my bug 14 times before I hooked it.
- Crappie don't like to hit on the surface but sometimes you'll see their speckled dorsal fin on a roll and that means they are





Sometimes they suck in your fly, spit it out, and you don't even feel it.

eating something just below the surface.

- You must have moving water to hook up with a stumpknocker.
 - Shellcrackers feed cooperatively.

Sometimes there are so many of them you can smell them.

• Don't put your fish on the reel. Put the fly rod down and pull the fish in hand over hand.

• If your floating line starts sinking, it's dirty. Clean your line, even when you're fishing, and it'll last a lifetime. The go-to is

Cortland's silicone-based line cleaner.





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Rick Warfel: Jack on the beach in Lido Beach

Dayle and Barbara Mazzarella: Hams Fork River



Tie the White Polar Fiber Minnow with Bill Scarola and Bruce Evensen





Instructors Bruce Evensen and Bill Scarola on the job

In case you missed it we're back to tying flies in person on Mondays at Bruce's studio at 531 80 Ave, North in St. Pete. Bruce and I will lead members through the steps for the White Polar Fiber Minnow starting at 6 pm on Monday, September 12.

Bíll

Materials for White Polar Fiber minnow

Hook: Short shank or circle hook, size 1 or 2 Thread: White, flat waxed Body: White polar fiber or select craft fur, or similar Beard: Pearl Crystal Flash, or microfiber, or other. Eyes: Stick-on in 5 or 6 your choice Glue: UV epoxy, and eye attaching glue of your choice

Tying Sequence

(Note: This fly is tied *High Tie Style* with all material placed above the hook shank

1- Wrap hook shank with thread

2. Attach a small bit of red fiber just in front of the hook bend. After you anchor the material in place, hold the material straight up and apply a few wraps under and around it. This can help keep the material above the shank.

3. Add a clump of white fibers. Tie them just in front of the red beard. Be sure to keep the fibers tapered. You may have to clean out some stray and or fibers that are too long.

4. Add several strands of pearl Crystal Flash to each side of the minnow.

5. Add a second bit of white fibers just in front of the first bunch allowing the fibers to create a tapered look.6. Be sure to add enough material so it's up to the hook eye.

(Note: If necessary, you may add a third bit of fibers to create the full minnow body. You can add a top color instead of white such as olive, gray, etc. White material should always go in first or second, then add a color to the top of the white if you choose.)

7- Whip finish the material.

8- Attach the eyes, add a drop of glue to each side of the fly and be sure to keep the eyes above the shank.

9- Apply a bit of UV epoxy to the eyes and thread wraps.

Smítty's Fly Box: Sílversíde/glass mínnow

Silverside minnows are also known as glass minnows which are also known as anchovies. They are one of Tampa Bay's most prolific baitfishes along with sardines and threadfin herring. This is an imitation anchovie so please don't put it on your Caesar salad.



Silverside Glass Minnow

Materials

Hook: Gamakatsu SC15 #1/0 or Daiichi 2546 #4 Thread: Fine monofilament thread Flash: Pearl Krystal Flash Body wrap: Pearl braid Body: Pearl flash dubbing Gills: Red braid Overwing: Holographic silver flash dubbing Eyes: 3/32" Silver eyes Epoxy: Solarez thick formula Overcoat: Solarez "Bone Dry"

Tying Sequence:

Attach thread ¼" behind hook eye and wrap back to mid hook shank. Fold Krystal Flash around the standing thread then tie down to hook bend. With staggered snips, cut flash to size you want minnow to be.
Tie in pearl braid and advance thread to halfway point of shank. Wrap pearl braid forward to standing thread and tie off and trim.

3. Tie in red braid then advance thread to original tie in position. Wrap red braid forward to standing thread and tie off and trim.

4. Measure pearl dubbing for length, tie off and fold excess to back and tie down. Repeat the same process with holographic dubbing.

5. Apply eyes to either side of fly at original tie in point making sure they are even. Add a drop of resin on top between eyes and cure.

6. Apply resin to the body of the fly back to hook bend and allow to totally saturate the body material (make sure to stretch body material backwards as you do the curing process).

7. Overcoat resin with "Bone Dry" making sure to apply over eyes as well.

8. Trim body material to desired minnow shape. Go fishing!!!

Capt. Pat Damico: Captain's Corner

We get better as we age

In saltwater, we use heavier equipment, must cast farther with accuracy, and are constantly confronted with adverse wind conditions, a combination of issues that if not approached properly will cause physical deterioration of muscles, ligaments, and joints. Even younger tennis players and golfers suffer because of these issues. Tennis elbow and golf wrist are frequent

results. The reason is usually poor execution of fundamentals. Someone who has never fly-fished can have an advantage over a veteran who has many issues with poor muscle memory. I often hear people say, "Fly-fishing is too much work!" Find a fly-fishing club in your area. It will have fly-fishers who share the same interests at many levels. Also, you can find capable instructors who will get you on the correct path to make this a safe, enjoyable pastime.



Tampa Bay has generally met water quality standards in each bay segment, excluding Old Tampa Bay, since 2006. (<u>Tampa Bay Estuary</u> <u>Program</u>)

Say goodbye to the Redneck Riviera. Heading East toward Tampa on the Gandy you'd always see cars nosed up to the water between mangroves. No more. The state DOT has installed pilings in the sand to block cars. It'll protect the mangroves and eliminate overnight parking, too. Oh well. Changes in latitude, changes in attitude. You know the thing. When you're fighting a tarpon on the fly you need to know this. You need to synch your body with your fly rod. Andy Mill, who needs no introduction, has been there, done that. The tip of a fly rod is used for short casts, the middle is for medium to longer casts, and the butt is used for fighting fish. Your body is similar to the rod, with some parts capable of extreme power and other parts more suitable for feel and lighter resistance. If you misuse the rod or your body—and usually it's both at the same time—the catch you're hoping for is highly unattainable. (Tail Fly Fishing)

How to tell a false albacore from a bonito. There are many ways but the most graphic, and probably the best, is to look at the teeth. Still don't know? Then do this. *Stick your finger in its mouth--if it comes back bloody, it's a bonito!* Btw, catching false albies on the fly is the subject of our October meeting. (Stripersonline)

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

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

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
