


Weedon Island Preserve is one of our club's favorite outing locations so it's back on the schedule for January. It's a good month for Weedon. Big spotted seatrout are on the flats and they are hungry.


The Suncoast Fly Fisher catching the longest speckled trout will earn a \$10 gift certificate to a local fly shop. Measure it. Take a picture of it. Show it to one of the outing

committee members at the picnic. The picnic is at the pavilion (the only one) on the north side of the main parking lot. Fat juicy burgers and hot dogs are on the menu. Hot coffee, too. And chips. And cookies. You know the thing.


Check out the visitor's map and other details on the Weedon website. There's a kayak launch and many places to wade in and start fishing from the preserve. Wade fishers often meet up in the main parking lot at 7 to 7:30 am. Some will probably hike to and wade fish the Riviera Bay shoreline. Some like to wade in at the kayak launching area. And some will take the 10-15 minute hike down Lookout Point Trail and wade into Tampa Bay.

You can also rent a kayak at the <u>Sweetwater Kayaks</u> station on Weedon Drive. Master's Bayou (Snug Harbor) also is a great spot to fish but you'll need to launch a kayak at one of the access points on the south side of Gandy Boulevard.





Fly-fish the water surrounding Weedon Island Preserve including the open waters of Tampa Bay, Riviera Bay, Bayou Grande, and Masters Bayou (aka Snug Harbor). The protected waters between the islands are good this time of the year, too.



It's a negative low tide day. The tide bottoms out about 9:15 then starts to come in fast. Low tides like that force spotted seatrout into deeper holes.



## Woody Miller: The reason I fish from a kayak

I believe and this is only my view, that a kayak and fly fishing were made for each other. If we stop and really think about where we fish with a fly rod, it's shallow bays, oyster encrusted mangrove shorelines and pock marked flats. Or it is that small pond with no ramp, lakes filled with downed trees and other structures, locations where a boat and motor is not convenient.

You may counter with the fact that wading is the better way to fly fish and I can readily agree if the area supports the firm bottom necessary to walk which limits

you to where you can fish.

We live in the areas where

lakes and ponds are inhabited by largemouth bass and other freshwater species. We must also realize that these waters are the homes of alligators and deadly snakes, mucky bottoms that will suck the shoes off your feet and holes that will float your hat when these dark bodies of water hide the bottom. Saltwater wading offers its own group of circumstances that can ruin a good day of fishing.



Oyster beds that will destroy a good pair of wading boots and waders, soft sucking mud that can hold tight to legs, stingrays that will harpoon you. Wading is limited for the waters we wish to fish.

Now those that have the availability of a skiff to fish from do have their advantages. First and foremost is the ability to get to many locations over the period of a day of fishing. Second is the ability to carry more gear, be it rods, numerous boxes of flies, a change of clothing if the weather changes during the day or being able to outrun a storm that pops up during those hot summer days.

What I find to be advantages for fishing from a kayak for me are that I can load my kayak in the back of my truck, put a couple of rods in the back seat with a box of flies and a paddle and I can fish anywhere, no launch ramp, no trailer, no gas, I'm quiet to the point of stealthy. If the bottom is firm I can stake out, step out and hunt on foot.

#### Be prepared

Now there are some considerations that must be taken into account. The two most important are to wear your life jacket and always be aware of the weather and tide. You cannot out-paddle a storm. Wind and waves can develop into being unmanageable if unprepared. Even after 50+ years of paddling canoes and kayaks I do not get far from shore if the forecast is not within my ability to return safely and for that fact, who wants to fish in conditions where just casting becomes a chore. Dress for the weather, but carry a jacket just in case. Always carry enough water. The one thing that will keep you safe is common sense.

## Bruce Evensen & Bill Scarola tie Bruce's brush crab fly



Bruce

The brush crab fly is our choice fly of the month for fishing mangrove shorelines because this is habitat for all those little tree crabs. And those mangrove tree crabs are breakfast, lunch, and dinner for the big three inshore gamefish – seatrout, redfish, snook.

The brush crab fly is productive away from the shoreline, too, because all gamefish are opportunistic feeders. You can crawl it across the bottom, jig it up and down, or retrieve it slowly just under the surface.



#### **Materials**

Hook: 3407 size 4 or 2

Eyes: Crab shrimp eyes, in orange or red epoxy.

Legs: Brown/black rubber silly legs

Head: Brown bucktail Body: E P crab body brush

NOTE: See picture. The body material is multicolored or tan-colored. Use magic markers to

adjust the colors as necessary.

Weight: Medium barbell eyes. Or, alternately,

wrap the hook with lead wire. Thread: Brown, flat waxed.

#### **Tying sequence**

- 1: Wrap hook, from eye to bend.
- 2: Add brown bucktail over eyes so it goes past the bend about 1 inch.
- 3: Add shrimp eyes, about half way on shaft, so eyes jut out past the bend about half an inch, as shown.
- 4: Add Sili Legs, two each side. Keep them longer than the shrimp eyes.
- 5: Attach a medium barbell eyes just behind the hook eye. or wrap several lead wraps on the shank just behind the hook eye.
- 6: Add the brush material behind the hook to the bend and whip finish the material. Add a drop of glue on the thread.
- 7: Trim with scissors to flatten the top and bottom of brush material and to form it into a crab shaped body.



## Smitty's Fly Box: Split Tail Clouser

This is a good redfish version of the Clouser.

I like to tie it all white for docklight or beach fishing for snook.

You may substitute Finn Raccoon for the Arctic Fox wing as well.

#### **Materials**

Hook: Saltwater streamer hook size 8 - 6

Thread: Flat waxed nylon (choice of color to match)

Eyes: Lead barbell (size your choice, I use small, or medium for

deep or fast current)

Tail: Red or Orange Arctic Fox hair and Red or Orange Badger

neck hackle

Body: SLF Dave Whitlock Minnow Belly Dubbing (or favorite

dubbing with flash)

Wing: Red or Orange Arctic Fox hair

Flash: Krystal Flash Finish: Solarez UV Resin

The more the merrier

#### **Tying Sequence**

- **1:** Lay down thread base to cover hook finish at one third shank position.
- 2: Tie in lead barbell eyes securely.
- 3. Tie in a small amount of Arctic Fox Hair.
- **4.** Tie in a pair of Badger neck hackle, make sure they splay outwards.
- **5.** Prepare a dubbing loop and dub in the SLF Minnow Belly dubbing.
- **6.** Spin in the dubbing to create a belly.
- 7. Brush the dubbing.
- **8.** Tie in the Krystal Flash at the side.
- **9.** Tie in another bunch of Arctic Fox Hair as wing, trim the extra.
- 10. Tie in some Krystal Flash on top of the Arctic Fox Hair
- **11.** Whip finish and apply the UV Resin to coat thread head wraps.

## Layne Smith's Fried Grouper Recipe

This recipe serves 8 but it can easily be adjusted for more or less.

#### **Ingredients**

8 (6 oz) grouper fillets 2 large eggs ½ tsp salt ¼ tsp cayenne pepper 1 cup all-purpose flour, seasoned with salt and pepper to taste



Cornmeal/Panko mix for dredging the fish Vegetable oil for deep-frying the fish 1 red onion, sliced very thin leafy butter lettuce 2 tomatoes, sliced thin 8 soft sandwich rolls, split

#### **Directions:**

Beat together eggs, salt and cayenne in a shallow dish.

Place flour mixture and cornmeal/Panko mix in separate shallow dishes.

Dredge each fillet in flour mixture and dip in egg wash.

Dredge fillets in cornmeal/Panko mix last.

In a deep fry pan, heat 1-inch of the oil to 375° F. Fry the fillets in batches for 2 to 4 minutes on each side, or until browned and cooked through.

Transfer fillets to paper towels to drain.

Layer the red onion, lettuce, tomatoes, and fillets on the sandwich rolls, accompany with thick cut or waffle fries.

## Capt. Pat Damico: Captain's Corner

#### Make the wind your fly casting friend

"I'm going to use my spinning rod today. It's too windy to fly fish."

This is a statement I frequently hear this time of the year because of windy conditions. The clear water flats are free of floating grass and make sight fishing for trout, reds, sheepshead, and occasionally snook a perfect venue.


Wind can be a help or hindrance. Perfect calm makes it easier to see fish, but they are very spooky, making long casts necessary. A little ripple on the surface from the wind hinders our ability to see fish, but they are more relaxed, meaning we can get closer. A nine-foot fly rod, the ideal length for most of our fishing should keep the fly, and hook, at least that far away from you.

If the wind is blowing into your non-casting side, there is usually only a problem with casting accuracy. Wind into your casting side can be a problem easily corrected by casting horizontally and close to the water, giving the wind little chance to affect it. A very tight loop in your line created by having the rod tip travel in a straight line path will be almost unaffected by the wind. A large loop will be a disaster especially if thrown high.

A strong wind into your casting side can be problematic, easily corrected by casting on your line-hand side using either a cast with your arm across your body, or tilting your body away from the wind and, "brushing your hair," with your casting hand as you have the rod tip travel on your leeward side. Learning to cast with both hands is an ideal solution.






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
