### The Passing of a Fly Club Legend



Layne Smith, who always went by the name "Smitty," died at home on January 29.

Layne (Smitty) Smith, one of the founders of the Suncoast Fly Fishers and our club's longtime fly tying guru, died peacefully at home on January 29. Funeral services were Tuesday, February 6. A visitation gathering was the night before at Memorial Park Cemetery. Many members of the Suncoast Fly Fishers and the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Clubs attended.

There have been many expressions of sadness by club members.

Rick Warfel: *Smitty was a founding member of SFF and one of the sweetest people you* 

could ever meet. He will be sorely missed.

Tom Gadacz: Smitty was a great fly-fisher and a contributor to the art and science of fly fishing. He made many great flies and was always tying at our meetings. He shared his knowledge and was always very positive. We will miss him and he leaves a great legacy.

Toni Fernstrom: That's very sad news.. I remember Smitty as being very open and welcoming when I joined SFF, and the two of us bonded around our interest and passion for fly tying.

David Redd: *He was truly a mentor.*

Bill AuCoin: Smitty was like the glue for our club" He would set up and tie flies at every meeting. And we all learned so, so much.

Smitty was born November 20th, 1945, in Clarion, Pennsylvania. He moved to the Tampa Bay area with his family while a teenager and attended Dixie Hollins High School.

In 1970, his future wife Basia, then living in New York, was introduced to him by her mother Josephine. Their relationship blossomed through heartfelt letters exchanged during this time, and they were married in 1971.

Layne embarked on various career paths, including roles as a ballroom dance instructor, stage magician, shipping director, and postal worker. He was also deeply passionate about fly fishing, frequently sharing his expertise as a keynote speaker, exhibitor, and teacher at local fly fishing events. One of his proudest moments was having his fly pattern published in a dedicated fly tying magazine.

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
### Bob Burkard: February 17 outing, Cypress Point Park

I'm really looking forward to this month's outing at Cypress Point Park. It has a firm-footed flat with lots of migration channels and drop-offs that fish like. And, with a low, incoming tide, I'll be ready to cast to redfish moving onto the flat to feed.

Yes, redfish is, as Alan Sewell used to say, the "designated species." The member catching the longest one wins the outing gift certificate. Be sure to measure it and take a picture, too. That's why it's helpful to have a fishing buddy nearby, somebody you can help when they catch a fish.



We'll start with a negative low tide and an incoming flow that speeds around the Howard Frankland bridge. (Tides4Fishing)

Remember to measure and take pictures of other inshore gamefish that you catch -- seatrout, use those catches might take the lead in the annual outing tournament. See the opportunities in

ladyfish, snook -- because those catches might take the lead in the annual outing tournament. See the opportunities in the chart below.

### Walt Durkin's tips for wade fishing Cypress Point Park

(Editor's note: Walt Durkin, president of the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club, loves to wade-fish Cypress Point Park, which is the location of our February outing. Here are some of his secrets. Redfish are his favorite because they often travel in schools.)

Walt's take on Cypress Point Park: "The park opens at sunrise and you can park in the main lot. Straight off the western sides of the beach are numerous deep holes.

Fish Clouser minnows deep along the bottom for snook, trout and lady fish. However, the best sight fishing is to the North on both sides of the sand bar. Wade near the sand bar going north in shallow water and look for fish.

On negative low tides the reds will wait in schools for the tide to come in. They will be spooky and hard to catch so make the most of

your first presentations. As the tide comes in the reds will move over the bar onto the grass flats. Here they will spread out and tail at times. Wade slowly and let the fish come to you.

**1. Favorite flies**. Walt's Rat Fly is probably his favorite but he's ready to throw crab and shrimp patterns. Match the fly color with the bottom color. Clouser minnow is good when the water is deeper (like 3 feet-plus) . Have weedless flies ready if you're picking up seagrass. Gurglers and spoon flies are great, too, depending on how the fish are feeding.

2. Fish low tides in the winter. The water's clear and you can do more sight fishing.

**3** Watch for tails. Those fish are feeding or looking for food. You can cast close to the fish when its head is down and tail is up. Throw a crab fly.

**4. Wade and wait**. Start in about 12 inches of water. Stop and watch for five minutes. Gamefish often travel with mullet. If you don't see any mullet, baitfish, or other sea life, move on.

**5. Stay safe.** Wear a whistle in case you need help. Shuffle your feet to warn-off sting rays. Avoid oyster beds which can throw you off balance. Wear sunscreen. Have bug spray ready, too. If a shark comes near slap the water with your rod tip and it'll rush away.

### Walt Durkin: Low Tide Redfish at Cypress Point Park

I have struggled to find good weather days to fish the Cypress flat, so when I saw bright skies on Saturday (20 Jan.) I told my wife I wanted to give it a try. She helped me get ready and sent me off with a peanut butter sandwich about 9:30. It was a bit of a late

start as the tide was low about seven, but I hoped the strong NE wind would keep the tide low.

Few cars were in the lot and none of the usual suspects that I could tell. Approaching the flat on the north side, I could see only one angler out there braving the 15 to 20 mph wind and

the tide was still very low with the bar showing. I walked along the bar and eased out about 100 feet from the other guy. He was facing my direction and making a few casts, so I was confident he was seeing fish.

Sure enough, after a few minutes I spotted the school making nervous

water and heading toward me. I tried a left handed cast into that wind, but came up short several times. I can cast pretty good left handed, but not so well into the wind. Anyway, the school turned and went back toward the other fisherman whose name I found out was Matthew.

So, I eased back out to the bar and circled around him and went down the flat about 75 yards to fish back down with the wind. I did not seen any fish as I worked toward Matthew, but he was still casting, so I knew the fish were still in his vicinity. He was stationed about 2/3 of the way down the flat in a sweet spot with a little deeper water.

I set up again upwind from him this time and about 100 feet away. He started casting straight out and then towards me a little. Soon, I spotted the school, maybe 50 reds heading toward me. I laid out a left handed cast about 60 feet and 30 feet in front of the fish. They kept coming and when they got around the fly I started bumping it. I try to move it an inch or two, stop a couple of seconds and repeat. After 10 tense seconds, I felt the take and set the hook.

I was fishing a new rod for me at least, a 7-weight Sage One. This is a classic rod with 10 year old technology, but still one of the best sticks around. After setting the hook, the rod bent in a beautiful arc and the fight was on. This was a strong 26 inch red that I played carefully for 10 minutes as I wanted to land him.

We had not eaten a red fish in six month and I told my wife I would bring one home. After confirming he was in the legal slot (18-27 inches) I put him on my fish gripper on a tether and he stayed with me all morning awaiting his fate. The fish had eaten a Bonefish Bitter fly I had tied a couple of days earlier. I went on to catch five reds that morning and Matthew did the same, including a couple of doubles.



### Cliff Nigh: Vessel Tour of USF's Western Flyer



On January 27th, 12 intrepid Suncoast Fly Fishers went to sea. Well, kinda-sorta.

In appreciation for the club's support and annual scholarship program, the USF School of Marine Sciences lowered the gangway and gave us a tour of *Western Flyer*, its new and largest research vessel, one of four used by <u>USF's Florida Institute of Oceanography</u>.

Capt. Quentin Lewis' affection for his ship

and the expanded capabilities it will provide to the school is readily apparent. He shared where the ship had been, things it had successfully accomplished, and planned upgrades.

The vessel is capable of housing, deploying and operating small and large submersibles up to the size of a minivan! Quentin relayed how they were able to hit the center of one of the Gulf's Blue Holes to take core samples...from two miles up from ocean bottoms. The submersible drone pilot area, although undergoing remodeling, was like something out of the movies. We were introduced to the laboratories, the vehicle launch area, and sophisticated equipment used.

And, we got a look at life aboard the ship including the mess hall and living quarters (much nicer than any of you Navy vets would have seen). We visited the bridge and, I for one, was amazed at the technology employed by the ship to accomplish its missions.

Howard Rutherford, our USF liaison for the club and Jill Thompson-Grim were in attendance and Jill was able to enhance our tour with real-life experiences in

regard to at-sea living and research.

All in all, it was

a morning well spent and provided insights into the types of research Suncoast Fly Fishers financially supports. You should all take a bow for what your club is supporting and the work it is doing. I scored a nice speckled trout about 14-inches at the Weedon Island outing but no ladyfish.

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

#### Steps

1. Wrap hook shank from eye to bend, THEN rotate vice to attach the eyes.

2. Add your eyes about 1/4" to 3/8" from the hook eye, depending on hook size on the hook shank top, Clouser style.

3: Attach a clump of craft fur in front of the bend. then mark 3 to 5 bands on both sides with a brown marker.

4. If adding hackle, attach it on top of the fur tie in and palmer several wraps forward 1/4-inch and tie off. The hackle extends below the hook, not the deer hair.

4b: Add first pencil sized clump of deer body hair in front of the hackle if used but behind the eyes. Pinch the body hair on top of the hook shank and apply two soft thread wraps, then pull it tight to spin the hair forming the head and throw two more wraps on spun hair.

4c: Add a second smaller clump of deer body hair in front of the eyes to the hook eye as above.

5: Trim the head, either with a razor or scissors, as shown. Be sure to expose the eye and leave the rear strands of hair reaching the hook point. This can act as a weed guard. And, be sure not to cut the hackle collar. When trimming the body hair, flatten the deer hair on the bottom, while rounding off the head.

6: Option: add several strands of gold Flashabou slightly longer than the tail craft fur after you put on the craft fur tail.



### Capt. Pat Damico: Captain's Corner

#### Notify your guide well in advance

An issue that will improve your fishing charter's success is to notify your guide well in advance and give him or her what days you will be available. Calling and saying I will be in your area this coming weekend and can only fish on Sunday morning will greatly affect your trip outcome. The date may already be booked, the weather could be terrible with rain and strong winds, the water may be muddy with the temperature dropping suddenly, and tides may be very poor. Wind direction alone can determine many of our fishing locations. We fly fish in relatively shallow water so reckless boat and jet ski activity is getting to be much more of a hazard as well as

a safety concern. Weekends usually begin midday Friday and extend well into late Sunday. This is why weekdays are always preferred. Rather than multiple emails and text messages, a phone call soon after your initial contact will give both of you some time to get to know how realistic both expectations are. Telling me you want to catch a 100-pound tarpon in the middle of winter with no saltwater fly fishing experience is not going to happen. I always encourage people to bring any equipment they may already own which can often be the cause of many of the problems they have experienced in the past. Several fly rods completely rigged are always with me to cover multiple situations.

### Jonas Magnusson: Best fly line when your fly is big and heavy

Now, some instances demand a big/heavy fly whether we like it or not. You know it's going to be a struggle – so, what to do?

I would consider a line with an 8' clear tip. The tip is intermediate and sinks very slowly. A big/heavy fly will pull the distal part of a floating line under anyway so the lines will be similar.

The advantage of the clear tip is that now you can get away with a short leader. The distal part 8' of your fly line is clear anyway. This line has a short head and is 0.75 sizes overweighted, so it has the mass to deal with a big/heavy fly.

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

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
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
