Gina Russo: Florida Marine Fisheries Update



MYFWC's outreach coordinator and biologist Gina Russo was our August meeting speaker. She updated us on all the new regulations and much more.

FWC biological scientist and outreach coordinator Gina Russo was our August speaker. She's been with the FWC for more than 20 years and her offices have moved here and there. These days her offices and staffers are in Apollo Beach.

Gina updated members on all of the changes that have taken place regarding that inshore gamefish fly fishers like to catch and (usually) release.

It was a lively, upbeat meeting with audience participation. Gina kept everybody involved with

talking-point slides and questions she tossed out, like, can you tell the difference between a pompano and a permit? Well, yeah. More than a few hands went up on that one. "I loved all the questions and banter," Gina said. Laughs and banter aside, here are some of the major takeaways from Gina's terrific presentation.

Florida is the fishing capital of the world

Florida is definitely the number one recreational fishing destination in the U.S. There are more than a million registered vessels and four million Florida anglers. We spend almost \$14 billion for gear and other fishing related things. Sport-fisher spending pays for almost 120,000 jobs.

Healthy populations are important


Florida's Fish and Wildlife department is leading the way on raising and planting snook, redfish and seatrout to make sure populations are strong, especially after red tide events. Digital chips are planted in some so when they are

caught it helps them know where they were planted and to which "parent" group they belong. Maintaining genetic diversity is important.

2024 snook, redfish, seatrout regulations

The Tampa Bay area gets so much fishing pressure it is its own management region, one of nine in Florida. To keep a snook it has to be between 28-33 inches and you can only keep it in the months of March, April, September, October, and November. Just one. We can keep one redfish in any month but it has to measure between 18 and 27 inches. We can keep up to four spotted seatrout over 15 inches but only one 20-inches or longer.

The excise tax helps us, too

The Sport Fish Restoration Program is Federal legislation managed by the US Fish and Wildlife Service. It collects excise taxes on fishing gear and motorboat fuel. The goal is to increase boating and fishing opportunities. In Florida funds go toward creating artificial reefs, improving boat ramps, and more.

Our September 21 outing was going to be at Emerson Point Preserve in Manatee County. This is where the Manatee River empties into Tampa Bay. Alas, we got closer to the date word arrived that there had been sewage spill in Bradenton that ruined water quality.

We have a fast, outgoing tide to a negative low tide then it will start to come back in about 9:30 am. Should be good.

Kelly and Wes Sobczak: Fly-Fishing Trip to Alaska

Wes and Kelly are finishing up their annual trip to Alaska. They have been at Alaskan Adventures Lodge on the Holitna River (about 210 miles northwest of Anchorage) fly fishing for silver salmon, sheefish, pike, grayling, pink salmon, chum salmon, and whitefish.

Here's their report:

We fly fished a different location in Alaska every year since we moved from Anchorage to Tampa in 2005. This year, we chose an off-the-grid lodge called Alaskan Adventures on the Holitna River. It holds up to eight guests per week.

To get to the lodge we caught a Piper Saratoga (a four-passenger, single prop plane) and flew approximately 210 miles northwest of Anchorage, landing on a grass runway next to the lodge. The lodge had four cabins including showers with on-demand hot water and wood-burning stoves for guests. The lodges had names like Moose's Hutt, which is the one we stayed in. You might think we were roughing it, but the chef was a James Beard award nominee. He cooks meals from the onsite garden, berries

from the wild, and lots of locally caught fish.

Fishing was done mostly from two-passenger boats but occasionally from shore searching for silver salmon, sheefish, pike, grayling, pink salmon, chum salmon, and whitefish. In earlier seasons we also targeted king salmon, sockeye, and char. Sheefish are known as "tarpon of the north" as they jump and fight hard when they are hooked and have large mouths. The grayling and char are typically found about a two-hour boat ride upriver.

Due to consistent rainfall, the water levels were high and muddy, so we didn't find any char. On the way back to the lodge, the boat broke down turning an eight-hour fishing day into more than 12 hours as we waited for another boat to come and tow us back; however, we were still able to fish as the current pushed us downstream while the guide rowed and kept us in good casting position.

MATERIALS:

- a- Hook, 3407, 4, stingers =6
- b- Eyes, med. barbell or bead chain.
- c-Body-macrame rope fibers, dark colors-green and brown. EP or Doll hair fibers work here too.
- d- Flash- green Krystal Flash
- e- Tail- green rope fibers left long.
- f- Glue- UV epoxy.
- g- Thread- dark colors flat wax, brown or olive.

HOW TO:

- 1= Wrap hook shank eye to bend,
- 2= Attach eyes behind the hook eye. w/ figure 8 wraps.
- 3= Add a small bunch of long rope fibers to form the tail. 2X hook length.
- 4= Add several strands of green crystal flash.
- 5= Attach bundles of alternating colors of green & brown rope fibers with figure 8 wraps. /be sure to keep the bundles close together. 4 to 6 may be necessary to fill in the hook shank. Stop at the tail fibers.
- 6= With your scissors, trim the body into a round shape. as shown.
- 7= Use UV epoxy to cover the body wraps. on both top and bottom.

Smitty's Fly Box - Chili Pepper Fly



Layne (Smitty) Smith RIP

The Chili Pepper Fly is mostly a yellow fly with a trace of red. It's simple to tie, with a strong profile, subtle action, and it works on every freshwater fish from brown trout to largemouth bass, and on inshore saltwater fishes, too. This is a simple streamer of feathers and thread - uniquely beautiful and unusually productive.

MATERIALS

Hook: Mustad 9674, Daiichi 1750 or similar 4XL ring-eye streamer hook, sizes 4 6. Salt? Use Mustad 33011.

Thread: Red or orange 140 Denier (6/0) to match

Body: Red Flatwaxed Nylon

Tail: Golden pheasant vellow body feathers

Wings: Up to five matched pairs of golden pheasant yellow body feathers.

Cheeks: Matched pair of golden pheasant red body feathers

Flash: (Optional) 1/8 inch strip of Baitfish Emulator Flash tied in before Step 5

Eyes: (Optional) Jungle cock, prepared ring-necked pheasant church windows. Note: Take small church window feathers; strip off fluff, dip fingertip into Softex or use a dab of Sally Hanson's Hard as Nails. Coat feather by drawing between coated finger and thumb blowing on it to harden in elongated shape. You may have to do this a couple of times to get desired look. It will closely resemble jungle cock when finished. Finish with a thin coat of Solarez UV Resin.

TYING STEPS

Step 1: Ring-eyed hooks in sizes 4 and 6 look best with the typical feathers from this smallish bird.

Feel free to use any 3xl to 6xl streamer hook to vary the sink rate and length of the baitfish profile to meet conditions. I like a 3xl, with the final fly having a strong oval profile to match a shiner. A 5xl or 6xl hook gives a slimmer profile mimicking a smelt. The first step is to lay down a smooth thread base.

Step 2: Tie on one yellow/gold pheasant feather from the saddle as a tail. I like to tie this in "flat" along the top of the shank with the length equal to 1.5 times hook gap.

Step 3: Match three pairs of body feathers for markings and size to complement the hook length. Stripping the fluff and preparing the feathers ahead of time makes for a very easy tie. Advance the thread to the one- third point on the shank and tie on one feather per side. This first pair covers about half the tail. Half hitch and advance the thread.

Step 4: Tie in a second pair of feathers at the 2/3 point on the hook shank. Half hitch and advance the thread to within two hook-eye widths of the eye. Tie in the final pair of veiling feathers.

Step 5: Match a pair of red cape feathers to be used as cheeks.

Step 6: Mount the cheeks, tie off and clip excess. Wrap a neat thread head and coat with Solarez UV Resin.



Capt. Pat Damico: Protect Fly Fishing Gear

Protect your fly fishing equipment. After fishing, rinse the rod and reel with a fine spray of water from a hose, reducing reel drag adjustment to minimal setting. Store the rod horizontally. When dry, strip the line that was used off the reel and clean with a towel soaked in warm water treated with non-detergent soap and dry with another towel. Apply line cleaner or dressing according to the manufacturer's recommendations. Remove the spool from the reel, clean, and lubricate lightly. Some reels do not require lubrication. If storing, remove each rod section and clean ferrules making sure sand or dirt is removed. Place a very thin application of candle or ferrule wax on each male ferrule. When assembling, some have four or more pieces, align guides or dots off center and turn the same way to align properly. Start with the tip section. To disassemble, begin with the butt section turning in the opposite direction as they separate and place in a sock then rigid

tube to prevent breakage. Occasionally, a light cleaning of rods with furniture polish will further protect the finish.


