depleted waters. Look for where rain runoff and canal salt water actually mix. Snook, Tarpon, Jacks, and even Ladyfish love to ambush in the cloudy mix.

Never caught a Gar? The time is now! Or after a storm. Look in canals in calm water right by current flows for Florida gars cruising and sitting up top. Strip right past their nose and set hard!

The wind is your friend. If you are frustrated in 40mph wind just use it to your advantage. Wind at your back, use a low back cast with an annoyingly high forward cast. Wind at your face, straight up back cast and finish your forward cast at your target. It's a lot easier than you think.

Dark Skies are the best skies. Catch a low ceiling of a storm and you may find the perfect minute of fishing. Remember most of our fish are nocturnal feeders and low light at noon is awesome.

Tight loops--- $J arphi \mathcal{W}$ (definitely not Tim Elms 😳)

Jim here. (definitely not Tim Elms) The pressure change? The water flow? The stirring of all things in the water? Yes, yes and yes. Fishing is usually great right before a large storm and after of course as water starts to drain and wash things all over.

Here's some tips on what to watch for on huge weather events to help you catch more fish:

Largemouth LOVE to swim the drop off edge of over filled ponds. Watch for bait up and in the grass of flooded ponds. The bass will be waiting right at the drop off.

Try fun and weird flies! Try extra-large flies around structure and flow points. The larger fish will be hiding waiting for a big meal without a lot of effort. Don't forget large top waters that make a ton of noise and move a ton of water.

Be aware of what's what salinity wise. Canals that flood are usually inundated with sewage, debris, and oxygen

September Speaker Tim Elms: Juvenile Tarpon from Shore

If you missed Tim's talk about Juvenile Tarpon on a fly last month, you missed a doozev.

Tim took us through his travels around the world (haha) it was nothing less than pure satire adventures.

Here are his real tips and lots of tricks:

- 6-8wt rod usually
- 40lb 25-40lb bite tippet
- Tim loves flies in yellow, olive, or white
- Fish Top water like you mean it and make a lot of noise.

• For those up and down rollers, let the fly sink down and strip back slowly.

- Find "Artificial Flow" Heavy rain runoff during a slack tide is a good starting point
- Summer High tides bring fish very far back into the estuaries, creeks, ditches, and canals
- Winter low low tides, they tend to hang out in the deepest spot of the creek. Look for areas that may have warmer water than others.
- Size 2 1/0 Hooks
- Look for drainage areas with culverts and pipes
- Rain is always a good thing to stir up the little Juvis •
- Watch for rollers, listen for eats and ALWAYS BE READY

TARPON ADVENTURES

- Practice casting around trees and obstacles
- Have fun. Its fishing




Bob Burkard: Outings



Bill Scarola: DT SPECIAL



Tim Elms OVE Meet up with other club members and tie two flies with Bill and Bruce pm on Monday, December 13. Bruce's fly tying studio is at 531 80th Avenue Pete. This is a great fly for catching snook at the beach so give it a workout at the FDP outing on Saturday, Dec. 18. Below is the DT Special pattern in two versions. The one on the top is a slight variation, using crystal flash instead of mylar strips. And note the head is shorter, exposing more of the hook shank. Both versions work well. For both versions take note of the position of the tail hackles and the mylar strip and of the palmered body/wing and also the length of the head.



Materials

HOOK- 3407 or C68S or similar, size 1, 1/0 EYES- Small to Medium stick on eyes, silver/black TAIL- Four white deceiver saddle hackles, two per side BODY/WING- One white neck saddle hackle, palmered HEAD- Thread built up and tapered

GLUE- UV epoxy, & Sally Hanson type nail finish

FLASH- 2 strips of silver Mylar strip, or 2-3 Pearl Crystal flash per side. THREAD- White, flat waxed

Tying Steps

1. Wrap the entire shaft with a thread base.

2. Add 2 white saddle hackles to each side. Match each pair up and tie in just short of half way up the shank.

3. Add one piece of mylar strip on each side

4. Attach one neck Saddle hackle on top of the tail thread wraps.

5. Palmer the above saddle hackle forward and tie it off. Keep


the fibers close together. (NOTE: see the picture above as to spacing, You want to leave about half the shank open.

6. Build up a tapered head of thread just in front of the palmered hackle to the hook eye. Make it large enough to attach your eyes and tie it off.

7. Put your stick-on eyes, just in front of the palmered neck hackle onto the widest thread wraps.

8. Apply your U V epoxy glue forming a tapered head. Cover the eyes and form a conical head to the hook eye.

9. Cure the epoxy and apply some Sally Hanson topping.

Tie the White Polar Fiber Minnow with Bill Scarola and Bruce Evensen





In case you missed it we're back to tying flies in person on Mondays at Bruce's studio at 531 80 Ave, North in St. Pete. Bruce and I will lead members through the steps for the White Polar Fiber Minnow starting at 6 pm on Monday, September 12.

Bill

Materials for White Polar Fiber minnow

Hook: Short shank or circle hook, size 1 or 2 Thread: White, flat waxed Body: White polar fiber or select craft fur, or similar Beard: Pearl Crystal Flash, or microfiber, or other. Eyes: Stick-on in 5 or 6 your choice Glue: UV epoxy, and eye attaching glue of your choice



Tying Sequence

- (Note: This fly is tied *High Tie Style* with all material placed above the hook shank
- 1- Wrap hook shank with thread

2. Attach a small bit of red fiber just in front of the hook bend. After you anchor the material in place, hold the material straight up and apply a few wraps under and around it. This can help keep the material above the shank.

3. Add a clump of white fibers. Tie them just in front of the red beard. Be sure to keep the fibers tapered. You may have to clean out some stray and or fibers that are too long.

4. Add several strands of pearl Crystal Flash to each side of the minnow.

5. Add a second bit of white fibers just in front of the first bunch allowing the fibers to create a tapered look. 6. Be sure to add enough material so it's up to the hook eye.

(Note: If necessary, you may add a third bit of fibers to create the full minnow body. You can add a top color instead of white such as olive, gray, etc. White material should always go in first or second, then add a color to the top of the white if you choose.)

7- Whip finish the material.

8- Attach the eyes, add a drop of glue to each side of the fly and be sure to keep the eyes above the shank.

9- Apply a bit of UV epoxy to the eyes and thread wraps.

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Capt. Pat Damico: Protect Fly Fishing Gear

While drifting the flats for other species, mangrove snapper are often encountered this time of year as they school in preparation for spawning later. When using a typical 8 or 9-weight fly rod with size 1 or 1/0 baitfish imitating flies, search for trout reds and larger fish, a snapper will occasionally be hooked.

Probing deeper areas in grassy flats, rock piles, and docks are often key locations. If one is found, many more are there. Use your anchoring system and change to a setup that will greatly increase your chances for success while adding to the fun. A lighter 4 or 5-weight fly rod equipped with a clear sink tip line and a 9 ft leader tapered to 8lb fluorocarbon is needed especially if the water is clear. Select a small weighted size 8 fly that imitates a crab, minnow, or shrimp.

To fish close to the bottom where the fish are located, use a countdown method. After the cast count until the line goes slack indicating the fly is on the bottom. On your next cast, begin the retrieve sooner. Keeping the fly close to the bottom or structure will give you constant action. A great experience for new fly fishers and children, the light fly tackle with give these strong small fish a chance to really pull, and their bait-stealing reputation will be foiled by constant hookups with smaller flies.
