President's Message: November 2024

Fishing is becoming frustrating! Due to many factors, it is becoming increasingly harder to find a place to fish that isn't affected by Red Tide, flesh eating bacteria or fecal matter in the water. Runoff from the hurricanes has literally flooded the bay with nutrients that have spurred these bacteria blooms. Furthermore, outdated and over capacity sewage treatment facilities released millions of gallons of raw sewage into the bay.

Unfortunately, these issues are not going away anytime soon. The water that flows into Tampa Bay comes from multiple counties, so until

harsher regulations are in place and all the counties are on the same page; the waters flowing into the bay will continue to be a major issue. For example, Pinellas and Hillsborough counties have a fertilizer ban during the summer months but Pasco County does not. The water shed for the northern part of the bay extends well into Pasco county. This is just one example.

On another front, the Tampa Bay Area suffers from over development. Hundreds of thousands of new residences are being built every year, many built in areas that used to be natural filtration for runoff. Now that runoff fills storm drains that dump it into the bay. These new residences also create a massive increase in raw sewage waste. Current sewage treatment facilities are inefficiently designed to handle this increase in sewage waste, we have seen the effects of their incapability far too many times.

These are just a couple of examples of issues that affect Tampa Bay, I'm sure we all could list many more. So, sorry for my soap box session, like I said at the beginning, it's frustrating! Man has no problem messing up the bay if he can make a buck while doing it, but is far too reluctant to spend a buck to fix it.



Tampa Bay Estuary Program



October meeting speaker Kerry Walia of the Tampa Bay Estuary Program updated members on the data and concerns for Tampa Bay in the wake of hurricanes Helene and Milton.

Our October General Meeting speaker was Kerry Walia from the Tampa Bay Estuary Program (TBEP).

Kerry discussed the work performed by TBEP and the progress made since the 1970s in restoring the Tampa Bay Estuary. Tampa Bay, the estuary and residents, are reaching a crucial decision-making point in time following horrific hurricanes Helene and Milton.

Since the 1970s TBEP has been a leader developing and implementing scientifically sound, community-based management plans.

TBEP Overview ...

TBEP leverages the resources of **program partners** and catalyzes action by:

- 1) Financing cutting-edge <u>research</u> that develops the science around key problems impacting the bay.
- 2) Sponsoring <u>restoration and management initiatives</u> that embody innovative solutions to address these problems.
- 3) Creating open sciencebased <u>analyses and graphics</u> that inform management and policy.
- 4) Providing "Mini-Grants" to community groups to engage the public in bay restoration and education activities
- 5) Developing <u>educational</u> <u>programs</u> and campaigns targeting and informing key segments of the bay community including educators, boaters and homeowners.

Here are some ways we can help the cause

- **1.** Give a Day for the Bay. Get dirty, give back, and have fun.
- 2. <u>Citizen science projects</u>.

When I got him in, I realized he was more like 8 to 10 inches

Greg Clark: Annual Fly-Fishing Trip to Northern Idaho

In September I met up and fished the St. Joe River in Northern Idaho with my buddy Doug, who I met while living in Boise and who now lives in Coeur d'Alene. It's been our annual fly fishing trip within Idaho & Montana for the last nine years.

We stayed in an RV park in Avery, Idaho. It had WIFI but no cell reception for 40 miles. We fished the St. Joe River near there with good fishable water and pull-offs on St Joe River Road for about 10-15 miles.

I flew into Spokane via Denver and that was about a two- hour drive from Spokane to Avery. The St. Joe River produces mostly cutthroat trout which we

caught plenty of and does have native mountain whitefish and some bull trout...but we didn't see or catch any of those.



Do it correctly: Catch it. Take a picture. Then release.

As I mentioned we caught plenty of cutthroat measuring mostly 10 to 16-inches. I did catch a personal best for me which was a little over 18 inches, with Doug as my spotter up high.

We had a great time as the weather was cool with mornings of 50 degrees, and sunny and warm during the day in low 80s, so we're able to wet wade during the afternoon to stay cool.

The trout took mostly dry flies of elk hair caddis, some big X caddis, stimulators, ants and other terrestrials. There were some pale evening duns and BWOs coming off as well, including the white spruce moth which hatches from all of the lodge pole pine trees there. Cutthroat will come clean out of the water to grab these moths.

Blondie Minnow Bruce Evensen and Bill Scarola

Due to flooding from the storms we **will not** be having any tying probably for awhile. Keep tying to keep your tying skills sharp!!!

Bruce Evensen's Blondie is a minnow imitation that appeals to fresh and saltwater fish year-around, and it will invite fish bites for Suncoast Fly Fishers fishing November's Safety Harbor outing in fresh or salt water.



Materials

Body: White bucktail only or, alternately,

chartreuse and pearl Flashabou with peacock herl and silver tinsel

Hook: #2 -3407 or # 2 stingers Glue: UV Epoxy and Super Glue. Eyes: Black marker or small stick ons Thread: White flat waxed and/or Uni Mono

Tying sequence

- 1. Wrap hook from eye to bend
- 2. Add white bucktail for the tail. Tie up to and just in front of the bend. Tail length should be 1-1/2 times hook shank length.
- 3. Add tinsel from 3/8" behind hook eye building up a thick body in the middle of the shank. Be sure to extend it beyond the bucktail fibers.
- 4. Tie in 6-8 strands of pearl flash in front of the tinsel so that it stays on top of the shank.
- 5. For the top of the fly tie in bucktail in front of the tinsel. If using peacock herl, tie it in above the top bucktail.
- 6. Whip finish a small head to secure bucktail, tinsel, and Flashabou.
- 7. Use black marker to dot the eyes or add the stick ones
- 8. Cover the head area with UV epoxy and cure. Alternatively, secure the head area with Super Glue.

Smitty's Fly Box – Gangster Gurgler



Layne (Smitty) Smith RIP

Layne (Smitty) Smith RIP tied this fly for members way back in 2015 and he said then this fly will entice all the hungry ones early in the morning, fresh or salt. It's still true. Pop this fly a few times at the November Safety Harbor outing whether you're fishing the fresh or the salt.

Materials

Hook: Daiichi 2546 size 1/0 hook

Thread: Grey Danville flat wax 210 denier

thread medium

Mouth: Red or orange cactus chenille
Eyes: 239 Flies crustacean eyes
Tail: Cream craft fur and Sand craft fur

Palps: Root Beer medium palmer chenille and Green grizzly hackle

Overbody: 239 Flies white/tan foam strip Underbody: Tan EP tarantula brush (½ inch)

Markers: Prismacolor marker (tan) Prismacolor marker (brown)



Tying sequence:

Step 1. Start your thread at the eye of the hook and advance it back to ½ the way down the bend of the hook. Tie in your cactus chenille and palmer to the point where the hook begins to straighten on the shank.

Step 2. At a 45 degree angle, tie in your 239 Flies Crustacean eyes right above where your chenille ends. You may need to wrap several times in and around each eye to space the stem from the hook. The end result should place both eyes about a ¼ of and inch away from the hook.

Step 3. Cut 4-5 clumps of both sand and tan craft fur off the hide and place on a table separately. Pull the "long and shorts" out of each clump so you have clean and tapered clumps. Stack the sand clump on top of the cream clump matching the tips and trim the butt section off so that you are left with 1 peice that is approximately $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length. Tie your craft fur just behind the eyes and bar them with the fat end of the tan marker and slim end of the brown marker.

Step 4. On the bump created where you tied in the craft fur, tie in a 2 inch piece of rootbeer palmer chenille and palmer forward 5 wraps.


Step 5. Tie in a green grizzly hackle and palmer forward 6-8 wraps. Break off the excess and wrap you thread backwards (away from the hook eye) pressing the last wraps or two of hackle fibers down.

Step 6. Advance your thread to ¼ of inch behind the eye and tie in your 239 Flies foam strip. You should tie very firmly back to where the hackle ends. Your thread should be hanging nearly touching the green hackle.

Step 7. Tie in your tan EP tarantula brush and palmer forward to ¼ of an inch behind the eye of the hook.

Step 8. Fold your foam strip back and down and tie onto the hook shank ½ of an inch behind the eye of the hook. Whip finish 2 times in front of the foam strip and cut the foam to length.

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Capt. Pat Damico We get better as we age

Fly fishing is one of the few sports, maybe the only one, where you can get better as you age. This depends very much on how you do it. In saltwater we use heavier equipment, must cast further with accuracy, and are constantly confronted with adverse wind conditions, a combination of issues that if not approached properly will cause physical deterioration of muscles, ligaments, and joints. Frequently, even younger sports enthusiasts in tennis or golf often are plagued with these issues that can be debilitating. Tennis elbow and golf wrist are frequent results. The reason is usually poor execution of fundamentals. Someone who never fly fished can have an advantage over a veteran who has many issues with

poor, "Muscle memory." Watching any accomplished sports enthusiast perform looks easy because most flaws are eliminated. An excuse I often hear is, "Fly fishing is too much work!" Do a search of Fly Fishing Clubs in your area and you will find a group of fly fisher's that share the same interests at many different levels. You can find capable instructors only too happy to get you on the correct path to make this a safe and very enjoyable pastime.

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


