Member Tribute: Alan Sewell, Layne Smith

At the December outing Suncoast Fly Fishers saluted two members – Alan Sewell and Layne (Smitty) Smith – who contributed so much of their time and talents to members and to the positive reputation of our club.

Alan Sewell

Alan is a cornerstone of the Suncoast Fly Fishers, serving the club with unwavering dedication since its inception. Over the years, Alan has held numerous leadership roles including two terms as President and two terms as Secretary of the Board. His contributions extend beyond governance; he has also been an active member of the Outings Committee and, for a period, took charge of publishing the club's newsletter.

One of Alan's most impactful endeavors was leading the club's partnership with Project Healing Waters, a program dedicated to helping veterans. Under Alan's guidance, the Suncoast Fly Fishers worked with veterans at Bay Pines VA hospital, teaching them the art of fly tying and fly rod building— skills that provide therapeutic benefits and foster a sense of community.

Alan's dedication and leadership have left an indelible mark on the club and its mission, inspiring others to share their passion for fly fishing and community service.



Nov. 20, 1945 to January 29, 2024 Layne (Smitty) Smith was a founding member of Suncoast Fly Fishers who created and taught fly tying over many years.

Layne (Smitty) Smith

Smitty, who died in early 2024, was one of the founding members of Suncoast Fly Fishers. Smitty demonstrated how to tie this or that fly at almost every meeting.

He served many roles in our club. However, he is best remembered for his fly tying skills and his fly patterns listed on our web site. Smitty has 41 named fly patterns listed on our SFF Fly Archive.

His attention to detail was incredible as shown in his detailed instruction. He focused on factors like balance, sink rate, water clarity, and ease of casting. His pattern descriptions frequently offered variations on color, size, and sink rate options, like his Sink of Float Foam Panfish Fly. The sink version was designed for "Mr. Picky Bluegill."

Smitty drew on his years on the water starting with his grandfather on farm ponds as a kid. That foundation brought him here to many years around Tampa Bay, Florida, and beyond.

Smitty's relatively simple Green Weenie is a classic creation. This pattern along with his Bluegill Killer have been used very successfully on our local waters for years.

Smitty's Cruella De Vil came to him as his daughter was watching the Disney movie, "1001 Dalmatians" with one eye on the vice and the other on the movie he found the colors matched the "sinister" character.

His patterns were created with the average fly tier in mind. He also provides patterns that he says is for the non-purist with his Squirminator pattern, which he says; "It's built to get through most any underwater situation." His love of tying

also brought him to classic, more challenging, patterns like the Black Ghost which was developed by Maine fly tiers.

His range of fly patterns cover a wide array of baitfish imitations, crabs, shrimp, sand fleas, bugs, and shiners. Smitty's legacy continues to bring many smiles to those who use his patterns to fish the beaches, mangroves, dock lights, rivers, ponds and lakes in the Tampa Bay area and beyond. As we fished for stump knockers, bluegill, bass, snook, trout, lady fish, red fish, mackerel, tarpon, pompano, bonefish, and even puffer fish.

Riviera Bay is great place for waders (not mucky) and ladyfish, our 10 gift certificate target, like to roam around Riviera Bay in schools. A couple or three


years ago members were catching ladyfish one right after another. And dolphin would rush in and eat the ladyfish as soon as they were released.

University of South Florida's College of Marine Science has selected the recipient of the 2025 Suncoast Fly Fisher's \$2,000 scholarship. Her name is Alexis P. Mitchem. Dayle Mazzarella: How to tie a 14-foot leader so you don't spook nervous fish

I can turn over a big fly quickly and without much fly line flying through the air!

How many times have we spotted a nice redfish, snook, or trout only to have the fly line spook the fish as we false cast?

I have used leaders as long as 24 feet when fishing for spooky trout in New Zealand, or on spring creeks like Silver Creek or Armstrong Creek in the west.

I normally use a 13 or 14 foot leader when fishing Tampa flats. When wading, some people like TBFFC's Leigh West can see fish 60 feet away while others don't see the fish until it's right on top of them. I'm somewhere in between.

I often see the fish at 30 to 40-feet and by that time any kind of a back and forth false cast will spook the fish. I need to load the rod with one forward cast. One forward presentation is all I often get.

I hold a 14 foot leader with maybe 4 feet of fly line out of the tip. That gives me a 9 foot rod, 4 feet of fly line plus a 14-foot leader gives me a cast of close to 30-feet. I can turn over a big fly quickly and without much fly line flying through the air! In essence this configuration causes the forward taper to be extended by 5-feet. A clear 5-feet.

We can even create a saltwater leader of 18-feet or more by making a few modifications. By cutting off most of the front taper and by adding appropriate leader material, a fly line with a clear front taper can be created.

In new Zealand I cut off the entire 8-feet of front taper and replaced it with 4-feet of leader material with a diameter the same as the terminal end of the remaining fly line. Then I added 4-feet of slightly smaller leader material, and then attached a 12-foot commercially-tied tapered leader. Bingo, I have a 20-foot clear "leader" that turns over 2 tungsten nymphs and an indicator. Now let's use this same principle to make a 14foot leader!

To do that I simply add 4- or 5-feet of leader material with the same diameter as the terminal end of the fly line. Now I add a normal leader. It's that simple! The biggest question I get is: "How can you ruin a good fly line?" My response is that I've simply created a new fly line. It can be used exactly the same as the original line. Almost all of my lines have been modified. The only exception is when I need the floating line in order to mend more appropriately.

I hope this gives everybody something to think about!

Fly tyers tied the "Winter Clouser" on January 6. Give it a go.

Materials

Body: upper, and lower dark colored bucktail, ex. Olive, browns, burnt orange, vellows, and or red.

Eyes: barbell and or bead-chain sized to match hook size.

Hook: , 1,2, 1/0. 2/0 Gamakatsu stingers or similar (3407)

Hooks sized 4 and 6 optional for smaller patterns.

Flash: Crystal flash or Flashabou, gold and/or pearl.

Thread: flat-waxed in colors to match materials used such as brown, olives, and/or orange and

Glue: Super Glue and UV epoxy with curing light. Legs: Optionally, add several dark barred Sili Legs for more fly action.

Tying sequence

- 1. Wrap hook from eye to bend,.
- 2. Attach eyes with figure-8 wraps about 1/3 way down shank.
- 3. Add a clump of your top material color. Tie it on in front and behind the eyes.
- 4. Add several strands of crystal flash to both sides. Don't be stingy with flash and tie it slightly longer than the bucktail.
- 5. Rotate vise over with the hook point up. Add bottom material with colors contrasting to the top materials you used. For example, tie burnt orange or brown on the bottom and olive on the top. Tie-in this material in front of the eyes only!
- 6. Whip finish the head of the fly by forming a tapered head to the eyes..
- 7. Add a drop of Super Glue to secure all thread wraps.
- 8. Then add UV epoxy to the head area around the eyes.

Note: Be creative with the colors of materials used. For example, try lighter colors on top and darker colors under, and vise-versa.

Smitty's Fly Box: Electric Bunny

I recommend tying this fly in two different color schemes. It's a great fly for "nosey" reds as they try to "sniff out" their prey while tailing. You can crawl it over the bottom or retrieve it with short strips. ... Good Luck!

Materials:

Hook: Gamakatsu SL12 S #2 to 2/0

Thread: Danville's Flatwaxed Nylon (to match body color)

Eyes: Medium to heavy Stainless Steel bead chain

Tail: Magnum zonker rabbit strip (rust or white) same length as hook shank Legs: Silicone legs (brown w/ orange glitter or clear pearl w/ silver glitter)

Body: Estaz (root beer or chartreuse)

Finish: Solarez UV Resin

Directions:

- 1. Start thread just behind hook eye. Build up a bump of thread then build up another bump of thread \(\frac{1}{8} \)" farther down the shank. Place bead chain between thread bumps and tie in securely.
- 2. Wrap thread in open wraps to hook bend. Tie down rabbit strip firmly with touching wraps of thread making sure skin side of strip is facing up.
- 3. Rotate to invert hook in vise and tie in 2 to3 lengths of leg material by wrapping them around the standing thread at their mid-point and securing them half each on either side of hook. Trim legs just beyond the end of zonker strip.
- 4. Advance thread to barbell eyes and tie in Estaz. Wrap Estaz in touching wraps to bend of hook covering zonker tie-in completely then over-wrap back to beadchain eyes to create a thicker body then tie off and trim excess.
- 5. With thread, create a smooth head by counter-spinning your thread before making head with touching wraps.

Captain Pat Damico: Captain's Corner



Moving water is critical to success

Consulting tide charts is always the first step in finding moving water. It will bring food to lazy fish, and it helps determine their location. Fish will follow as water leaves a shallow flat, frequently hanging around in the closest deeper water. This gives you two great times to fish. When the tide begins to come in, fish will ease up on the flat to resume feeding on shrimp, crabs, and baitfish. Reds, trout, and snook will all follow a similar pattern. Good polarized glasses are necessary to see where the darker grass flat transitions into a lighter grayish color, showing increased water depth. Grass flats with the most irregular edges are always the better producers. Offsets and changes are high percentage places for fish to wait in ambush of their prey. Casting accuracy is imperative as some of these areas will have a small target where fish will be

waiting. It's also necessary to have your fly or small jig land with minimal disturbance as you are still casting to relatively shallow water. Since we use flies, they should have little or no weight. Keep your rod tip low and close to the water after each cast to allow better line control and an easy quick recast if needed. If your cast is less than perfect, continue fishing it rather than have a follow-up cast rip the water, and scare the fish. Many nice fish have been caught on less-than-perfect casts.


