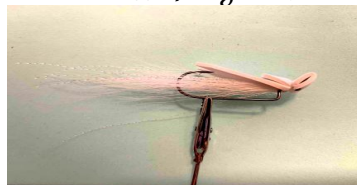

SFF Scholar Alejandra Aguilar Studies Mangroves and Sediments



Alejandra Aguilar, our May meeting speaker, was awarded the SFF Scholarship Grant for an incoming PhD student at the School of Marine Science at the University of South Florida.

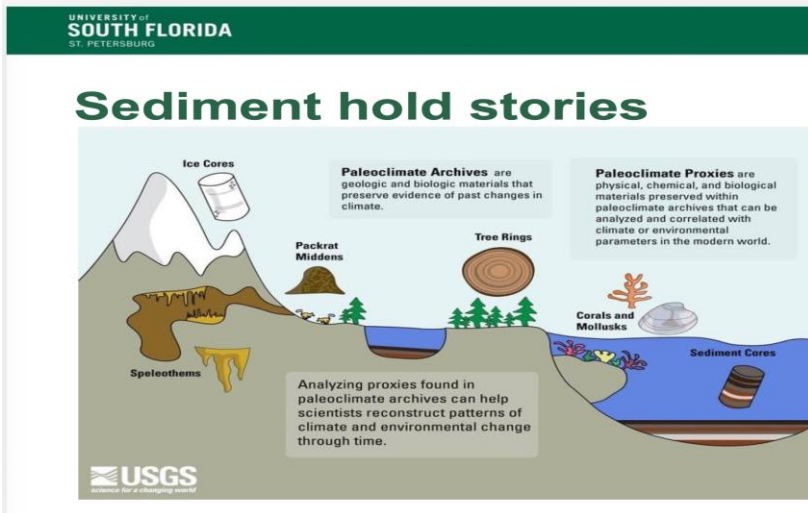
Alejandra Aguilar is going to get her hands dirty. And that's a good thing. She is a PhD candidate in the College of Marine Sciences at the University of South Florida in St. Petersburg. Her focus is mangroves and the dirt they grow in.

Her full name is Beatriz Alejandra Aguilar-Enriquez, but you can call her *Ale*. Ale told Suncoast Fly Fishers about her scientific journey at our May 21 meeting. The title of her presentation was "Mangroves, sediments, and stories."

Ale is the recipient of our club's annual \$2,000 grant for an incoming Ph.D. student. She accepted our invitation to talk about her scientific journey. She is from Guatemala and taught high school there. She said her scientific curiosity and "a little bit of stubbornness" led her to start researching marine life and sediments. Then she went to the University of Notre Dame where she earned her Master's Degree. And now she has been welcomed at USF - St. Petersburg for her PhD research and studies.

Ale is all set to dig deeper into the subject of mangroves and the sediment they grow in. What she discovers will make a big

contribution to the protection of mangrove coastlines as well as marine and plant life, especially Florida's coastal mangrove counties where the population is rapidly expanding.

St. Pete opens 18 lakes for summer fishing

St. Petersburg Parks and Recreation Department opens a number of freshwater and two saltwater lakes for the summer season through Labor Day. Fishing is permitted daily between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. A freshwater fishing license is required at all freshwater lakes for everyone except children ages 15 and under or anyone fishing in their resident county and using a pole without a reel. Florida residents over age 65 do not need a fishing license.

The following freshwater lakes will be open for shoreline fishing only (boats are prohibited):

- Crescent Lake Park - 22nd Ave. at Fifth St. N.
- Eagle Crest Lake - Sixth Ave. and 66th St. N.
- Euclid Lake - 25th Ave. and 17th St. N.
- Lake Vista Park - 62nd Ave. and 14th St. S.
- Booker Creek Park Lake - 23rd St. and 13th Ave. N.
- Childs Park Lake - 11th Ave. and 42nd St. S.
- Moon Lake - 13th Ave. and 42nd St. N.
- Kelly Lake - 40th Ave. and 20th St. N.
- Jude Lake - Sixth Ave. and 55th St. N.
- Lynch Lake - 70th Ave. and 18th St. N.
- Mastry Lake - 64th Ave. and 14th St. N.
- Ruby Lake - 26th Ave. and 35th St. N.
- Sheffield Lake - 24th Ave. and 49th St. N.
- Sirmons Lake - 33rd Ave. and 41st St. N.
- Teresa Gardens Lake - 32nd Ave. and 71st St. N.

Mote Marine releasing 22,000 juvenile snook in SW Florida

Mote Marine Laboratory & Aquarium in Sarasota is continuing to advance its fisheries enhancement efforts in 2026 through a series of juvenile snook releases taking place throughout the summer across strategic estuarine habitats in Southwest Florida. This year, Mote scientists will release approximately 22,000 juvenile snook as part of Mote's long-standing, research-driven marine stock enhancement program.

For nearly three decades, Mote scientists have worked to develop, refine, and evaluate responsible marine stock enhancement strategies for snook and other native sportfish species. The 2026 releases represent another step forward in Mote's science-based efforts to support Florida's recreational fisheries and enhance understanding of stock enhancement best practices.

"These releases reflect the continued growth and refinement of Mote's fisheries enhancement capabilities," said Dr. Ryan Schloesser, Manager of Mote's Fisheries Ecology & Enhancement Program. "Our focus remains on producing healthy fish, releasing them strategically, and collecting the scientific data needed to better understand how stock enhancement can support resilient wild populations."

Release locations are strategically selected based on environmental conditions and habitat characteristics that provide favorable environmental conditions and complex structure essential for juvenile snook survival and growth. Examples of favorable release habitats include tidal creeks, mangrove-lined shorelines, and sheltered coves that provide abundant food resources, protection, and complex habitat structure.

At Mote Aquaculture Research Park (MAP), researchers raised the juvenile snook that were released during these stock enhancement efforts while conducting studies that improve aquaculture practices and fish production techniques. The facility serves as a center for innovation, helping address challenges related to sustainability, conservation, and aquaculture needs.

Mote's stock enhancement program is guided by research objectives that examine post-release survival, movement patterns, habitat use, and the overall contribution of stocked fish to wild populations. Findings from these studies help inform adaptive release strategies, including optimal release timing, fish size, site selection, rearing conditions, and release methods. Prior to release, the fish undergo comprehensive health assessments to ensure they are well-suited for release.

In addition to physical tags, Mote scientists are working to utilize advanced genetic tagging techniques using known genetic profiles of parental broodstock. Through genotyping, researchers can identify individual fish and trace lineage from small tissue samples (such as fin clips) collected after release.

In addition to ongoing enhancement efforts, Mote is expanding its monitoring and response capacity throughout neighboring coastal regions.

Anonymous: Lessons Learned

A club member who wants to remain nameless and ageless (Good luck with that)-fell and cut his leg during the club's Everglades canal outing in May. It could happen to anybody of any age. Here are his two main safety takeaways. (Editor)

There is more to my story about falling on a boat ramp and cutting my leg.

Here's what happened:

I was trying to put the Gheenoe on the trailer. I was standing inside the trailer frame and pulling on the bow line to get the bow of the boat between the guide posts on the trailer. This is a technique I have used for years. Because of the strong wind, I was pulling very hard when my feet slipped on the slimy ramp. This drove my right leg into the angle iron trailer frame.

Result? A lot of blood and twelve stitches at emergency care. This was a painful lesson to me and hopefully to other boaters.

In the future, when I am using a slippery boat ramp, I will tie a longer line to the boat's bow line. With the longer line, I will be able to position the boat between the guide posts while standing on dry ground. I might still need to get in the water to complete securing the boat to the trailer but, if so, I will be very careful.

One more thing: Be sure you have a tourniquet in your first aid kit. I'm glad I had one in mine.

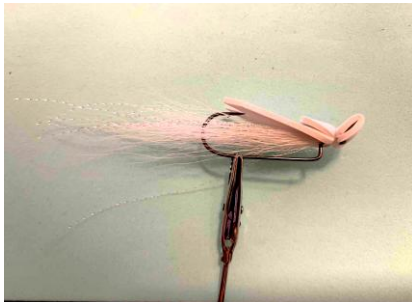

Materials for your foam, bucktail and thread should follow whatever color Gurgler you want.

- Hook: #1 or 1/0 worm hook
- Thread: 140 or 210
- Krystal flash
- 2mm foam cut 1/2" wide at least 3" long
- Super glue

David Redd: DT Special

David Redd led fly tyers through the steps tying the DT Special at Bruce Evensen's fly tying studio on Monday, June 8. This fly has earned a reputation as a superior fly for catching snook on the beaches.

MATERIALS:

- Thread: White 140 or 210
- Wing and collar: White American rooster hackle or strung rooster hackle.
- Flash: Opal Mirage Polar Flash. Other options include pearl Krystal Flash, pearl or opal small Flashabou, or other fine long pearl/opal flash.
- Eyes: 2-3 mm stick on eyes
- Glue and UV epoxy
- Hook: size #2-1/0. Mustad 34007, TMC811S, Dai-Riki 930, Gamakatsu SL12S, Gamakatsu B10S or Mustad C71SSS circle hook are all good options.

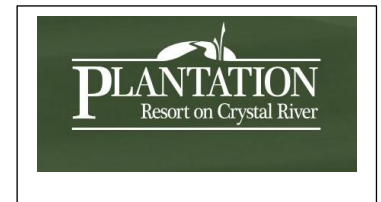

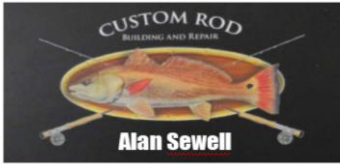

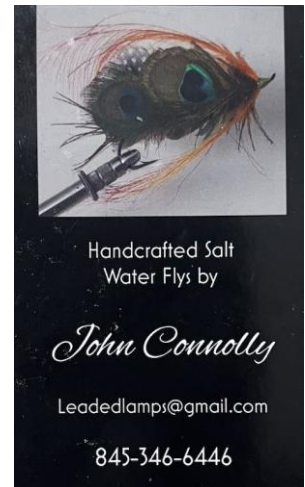
